New Orleans, Oct. 10.—An attempt to run cars from the Canal street barn this morning resulted in a serious riot which policeman Schlessinger was shot through the head and is probably fatally wounded.

Washington, Oct. 9.—The encampment of the G. A. R. which is the business meeting of that order, began its session today in the first Congregational church in this city.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 8.—President Roosevelt today reviewed the Grand Army parade from a carriage. He was carried down stairs from a room on the second floor of the temporary headquarters.

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Washington, Oct. 10.—President Roosevelt had a conference with Commissioner of Labor Wright today. The president spoke of the great seriousness of the situation, but gave out no intimation of the further steps looking to a settlement of the strike, which he had in mind.

New York, Oct. 10.—David Wilcox, vice-president and general counsel for the Delaware and Hudson railroad and one of those who were present at the recent conference called by President Roosevelt in Washington, has sent to President Roosevelt a letter demanding that the federal government proceed at once against the miners' organization on the ground that it is a conspiracy to prevent interstate commerce.

Omaha, Neb., Oct. 10.—Mrs. Henry Heubens, wife of the vice-president of the Storz Brewing company, and her two young sons were found dead in their home this morning. The windows had all been closed and the keyholes plugged up, and the gas in the room was found to be in a fit of despondency on account of ill health had evidently planned the death of all three, and had gone about with great deliberation to carry it through.

Washington, Oct. 10.—The Woman's Relief Corps today elected Mrs. J. L. Leister of Minnesota, as its national president, and Mrs. Gertrude Frisby of California, as senior vice-president.

Columbus, Ohio, Oct. 10.—Governor Nash today pardoned Mrs. N. L. Taylor and her daughter, the alleged Cincinnati kidnappers of Clara Taylor.

Chicago, Oct. 10.—A riot call, fights between hysterical girls, and the arrest of the girl leaders, marked the girl box-makers strike at the plant of J. C. McLaughlin, last night. Patrol wagons were used to carry many of the girls beyond the picket lines of the strikers.

Wilkesbarre, Oct. 13.—Interest was centered here today in the efforts of the coal companies to induce men to return to work under the protection of troops. Judging from all reports from the various sources there were but few additions to the workers in the mines today.

London, Oct. 13.—Ambassador Choate and General Corbin, Wood and Young were the guests of King Edward at a luncheon today at Buckingham palace in honor of Lord Kitchener, prior to the latter's departure for India, where he is to take command of the British forces.

San Juan, P. R., Oct. 13.—There was rioting and shooting at several points today in the mountainous region of Pinarolosa and Rivera, with about 6,000 men and twenty-two guns. A fierce cannonade is now going on, but outcome of battle cannot be conjectured.

San Francisco, Oct. 13.—The United States transport Logan arrived here today from Manila, bringing 4,100 men and 123 sick and a large number of discharged and insane soldiers.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., Oct. 14.—President Mitchell refuses point blank to talk for publication at this time on the new proposal for arbitration of the strike which was laid before President Roosevelt last night by the presidents of the coal roads.

Washington, Oct. 14.—At noon today no communication had been received from President John Mitchell relative to the proposition of the anthracite coal operators. The offer was not transmitted personally, but was addressed to the public and it was assumed that Mitchell would take cognizance of it from the press.

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DEPUTY NOBLES' LUCKY CATCH, Arrests a Hobo Who Answers Description of an Illinois Murderer.

By a stroke of good luck coupled with good detective ability Deputy Sheriff Nobles, of Ash Fork, made an arrest yesterday which may result in the receipt by him of \$2,000.
