Bellevue.

With what varied emotions of pleasure, beauty and sublimity, have I wandered amid the deep, romantic dells and towering hills of New York, and surveyed by the stern grandeur and wild magnificence of her mountain land; but after nearly three weeks of weary journeying, not less joyous was my admiration and true pleasure, when, from the deck of our steamer, I caught the first view of my future home—the green hills of Bellevue.

How different had been my impression of a home in the far west—Nebraska. The dusky forms of the Indians, with their arrows and tomahawks, seem to have passed away forever, and we look in vain for their swift canoes on the muddy waters of the Missouri. But cultivated lands and broad prairies are spread out invitingly to reward the hand of labor; and hundreds of young men—intelligent, hardy and enterprising—are leaving their pleasant eastern homes, bearing yet fresh upon their hearts the dew of a father's blessing and a mother's prayer, and their bosoms swelling high in the full tide of youthful aspirations and energy.

And thus we have all come, each with our own sweet hopes of happiness and usefulness—our own bright dreams of prosperity and enjoyment—and though we may realize much, life can bring to none of us a golden heritage of unalloyed beauty and pleasure. But let us each, with a cheerful heart, struggle bravely against its many discouragements, mutually aiding each other in hours of weakness and despondency, and we may yet see in Bellevue the vine-embowered cottages, the commodious and tasteful mansions, the gleaming church spires, cultivated gardens and shaded walks so attractive in our eastern villages. Court House Meeting.

At a meeting called by the citizens of Bellevue, for the purpose of making arrangements to build a Court House for Sarpy County, the meeting was called to order by Gen. L. L. BOWEN; on motion Mr. GEO. JENNINGS was appointed to the Chair, and S. M. PIKE, Secretary, when the following resolutions were unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That we who are interested in Bellevue do pledge ourselves to build a Court House for Sarpy County, worth not less than ten thousand dollars, free of tax upon the balance of the County.

Resolved, That a Committee of three, consisting of Geo. Jennings, Wm. H. Cook, and Reuben Lovejoy, be appointed to carry out the foregoing Resolution.

Resolved, That the Commissioners who locate the County Seat, are hereby requested to let contracts to build the County Buildings immediately after the permanent location is made, and that all donations be made to them in trust for such buildings.

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Ordinance No. 2. Be it enacted by the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Bellevue, That a tax of one-half of one per cent. be levied on all the real estate within the incorporate limits of the City of Bellevue.

Ordinance No. 3. Be it enacted by the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Bellevue, That the Assessor proceed at once to assess the taxable property in the incorporate limits of the City of Bellevue.

CIRCULAR. TO THE LAND OFFICERS IN THE TERRITORIES OF MINNESOTA, KANSAS AND NEBRASKA. BY joint resolution of Congress, approved March, 1857, valid pre-emption claims on the 16th and 20th sections, heretofore reserved for schools, in the Territories of Minnesota, Kansas and Nebraska, will be recognized WHERE THE SETTLEMENT HAS BEEN, OR
