The viewers sent by the citizens to view and select a route for a road to Alsea valley returned last Tuesday. The viewers were A. J. Rader, Thos. Butler and Wm. Alexander and accompanied by A. J. Oglesby and Mr. Watkins. The viewers were four and a half days on the route and report finding a very feasible route for a road. The route as viewed is about twenty miles long and about five miles of the road is already built. It strikes the Alsea valley at the mouth of Fall creek. From that place to Alsea postoffice, except a half mile, the road is made. It was estimated that the road would cost about \$1,000 to build. Five hundred dollars are subscribed for the road at this end of the line and some has been subscribed at the Alsea end. A meeting will be held soon and the report of the viewers made in full.

The steamer Alice Blanchard, under arrest at Yaquina bay, was released Tuesday upon order of Judge Bellinger. It will be remembered that the steamer was recently libeled for \$5,000 by the Oregon Pacific for salvage, claimed for helping her off the sand spit opposite Newport. Subsequently two fishermen, Carlson and Andra, libeled her for \$10,000, for having gone aboard her while she was beating about the bar and piloting her safely in. The defendants appeared in court Tuesday and gave bonds in the sum of \$30,000, with D. F. Sherman, W. G. Heller and E. B. McFarland. She was accordingly released by telegraph. The trial is set for June 5, but the matter is likely to be settled out of court, as most of such cases are.

The burlesque, "A. O. H.," given by the members of the Odd Fellows lodge, at Yaquina City, in Grady's hall at this place last Monday night was simply immense. The boys acquitted themselves admirably in the manner in which they tore the screen of secrecy away and exposed to the gaze of the public the innermost secrets of their order. On Wednesday J. O. Stearns appeared on behalf of Lincoln county court and asked that the county treasurer be restrained from paying said warrant. The court granted the temporary order and the treasurer will not pay the warrant until the matter is so decided in the courts. The county court argues that inasmuch as the county never ordered the work done and further, that the work was not performed for Lincoln county, that the county cannot be held for the payment therefor.
