The annual meeting of the Yaquina Fruit Company was held at their office in Yaquina on August 9th, 1893. The Officers of last year were re-elected. Arrangements were made to set out ten acres of small fruit on their Nashville farm.

A game of ball was played last Friday between the 'Toledos' and the Hayseed nine, at the Stanton school house. The score stood 16 to 21 in favor of the Hayseeds.

The work of changing the West Side narrow gauge to a standard road has been completed, and the standard gauge trains are now running from Portland to Airle and on the branch to Sheridan. It is the general opinion that when the Southern Pacific began the work of changing the narrow gauge it intended to extend its lines in one or more directions, but owing to financial troubles which have become so wide spread since then, it is doubtful that their plans will be carried out for sometime yet.

The case of Stevens vs. McNeil, was tried before Judge Blue last Monday. The case was hotly contested on both sides, and considerable legal ability was displayed by the attorneys in the case. The plaintiff was ably represented by Attorneys Kelsay and Carson, and the defendant's side of the case was represented with much ability by Condon and Potter. The court rendered a verdict in favor of the defendant.

Welch, and she was the old mans daughter. He had sensitively kept her concealed all her life until within the last two months, when, being no longer able to earn a livelihood, he was compelled to exhibit her. As the father, who is seventy years old had no funds, the county authorities were notified, and will take in hand the burial of the unfortunate little creature.

County Court.

As the regular term of County court, the following proceedings were had:

Ordered that the road petition of W. H. Hulse and others be granted, that the money is hereby ordered to be used in completing the unfinished part, commencing at the West Yaquina and South Beach wagon road, connecting with the Alsea road near Browns' place, where said Alsea road leaves the road survey, that the sum of one hundred dollars, be, and is hereby appropriated out of the road funds, for the construction of said road.

In the report of the viewers on the wagon road commencing near the mouth of Depot slough, connecting with the pioneer wagon road is accepted and ordered placed on record, and that D. Grady be ordered to move the obstruction from said road within 30 days.

Contract for making county map showing all the principal rivers and streams, and showing all the state and school lands, let to C. M. Redfield, for the sum of \$185.00.

Plans for the building a bridge across the Yaquina river at Chitwood presented and approved.

Ordered that the Lincoln County LEADER be selected as the official paper of the county, until the first regular term of this court in January 1894, and that the compensation of said paper for publishing county business be fixed at the rate of forty cents a square, of 10 brevier line or its equivalent in newspaper measure.

Ordered that the contract for the construction of the bridge across Rosebrooks' flat be awarded to I. J. Pepin, for the sum of \$212.75.

Ordered that the court reserve the right to put in the size timber that they wish with the privilege of paying for the work.

Ordered that judge is instructed to prepare the necessary instructions and bond, and sign the same on behalf of the county.
