We would call your attention to the fact that there is no more important day in the year, so far as our community and state are concerned, than the annual school meeting day, which occurs on the 16th of this month. People get in any form of government about what they demand, and if only three or four people attend the annual school meeting, it shows that their demand is lacking. School officers and teachers become discouraged and as a consequence, poor results follow.

Toledo is justly proud of her schools and in order to keep them at their best it is necessary to have good school officers. Decide on some good men for these responsible positions and turn out next Monday and help elect them. Don't wait for the other fellow to do it—do it yourself.

Do You Want A Creamery?

A number of progressive farmers in this vicinity have joined together and formed the Toledo Co-Operative Creamery Association. These men are working hard to make a success of the organization but are not receiving the support that they should. This creamery, if built and supported by the farmers and dairymen, as it should be, will save them many dollars which now go to enrich the Valley creameries. These men who are behind the movement will receive no more for their butterfat than any other member who chooses to join. The plan is to pay all money taken in above actual expenses to the farmers and members selling cream to the institution. Of course the dairymen who is a member will receive a little more out of it than the man who is not a member, so it behooves the man who is selling cream to be a member, otherwise he will receive only the market price for his product.

Twelve hundred dollars' worth of memberships have been subscribed, but there still remains a similar amount to be taken before the directors can commence building operations, as it is estimated it will take this much money to put the plant in operation and pay for the first month's butterfat.

Now, Mr. Farmer, you who have not taken a membership in this association, don't you think you are losing more than the price of a membership each year in shipping your cream to the outside creameries? Don't you think it would be money in your pocket to come forward and take a membership in this association instead of holding back and holding the matter up?

Think this over, Mr. Farmer and Dairymen, then come forward and invest twenty-five dollars in a membership. If you haven't the ready cash, your note will be acceptable to the association. This is your opportunity, Mr. Farmer, as you are going to grasp it, or are you going to let the matter drop for want of your support?

If there is anything about the association you do not understand, you are invited to meet with the directors at the City Hall in Toledo, Saturday, June 21st at 1 o'clock p. m.

taxes in the county. This meeting will mark the regime of a new epoch in the collection of taxes.

Hereafter the County Treasurer will be Tax Collector and will collect taxes from the time the roll is turned over to him by the Assessor—about the first of the year—up to the first of September, when the roll becomes delinquent, and is turned over to the Sheriff for collection.

Taxes legally levied and charged in any one year shall be paid before the 1st day of April following; and if not so paid 1 per cent penalty shall be charged. On May 1st, 2 per cent penalty added; July 1st, 3 per cent penalty added; July 1st, 4 per cent penalty added; August 1st, 5 per cent penalty added. On September 1st property will become delinquent and 10 per cent penalty and 12 per cent interest will be charged.

In the event that you pay one half of your taxes before the 1st of April, the other half is subject to the foregoing penalties. No rebate is allowed for the early payment of taxes. The Sheriff will collect the delin-

Edwin Weed Attempts Suicide

Tuesday evening about eight o'clock Edwin Weed attempted suicide by slashing his throat with a razor. Mr. Weed, who is making his home with Mike Strylewicz, has been in poor health for some time and Tuesday evening feeling worse than common, he decided to end his suffering. Taking a looking glass and razor he proceeded with the job. He is a very large man weighing some 250 pounds, and his neck is large in proportion.

After sawing and slashing at his windpipe for some time, without being able to get through the tough gristle surrounding the larynx, he laid the razor down and inserting his fingers into the wound he tried to tear it apart. It was at this stage that he was discovered and medical aid summoned. He had cut one artery which had to be tied and several large gashes which had to be sewed up.

Mr. Weed is 68 years old and has no relatives here. He has been a resident of Toledo for several years formerly working for J. O. Smith at the tannery, he being a harness maker by trade.

It is feared that he may again attempt his life as he stated that if he had had a pistol he could have made a better job of it.
