There has been so many suffering with la grippe at the logging camps the past week that it has been impossible to furnish logs enough to keep the sawmill running, consequently the mill has been closed down a part of the time.

## SAM IRVIN MAKES COMMENT

Editor Leader:—I was very much pleased when I read the heading of your editorial "Tide-land Owners Need Not Worry," but after perusing the article the finish it does not seem to me to bear out that conclusion. Unfortunately in this case the assessment of the land has but little to do with the title. It might be assessed to one person and owned by another, as is often the case.

A more important question is, what lands did the state grant to the railroad company. The railroad company has spent large sums of money in making surveys and listing the lands they claim, and in accordance with law have given notice that they claim them, and who has a right to say who is the rightful owner, except the courts?

It does not make any difference to the railroad company who owned the lands before they got it. The court says the state had a right to grant the lands to the company, and now they are surveying and claiming all the lands of a certain classification regardless of whether it is within or without the meander line, and with perfect indifference as to present or former owners.

If one would ask Mr. Herron, Mr. Fulton, Mr. Fenton, Mr. Colvig or Mr. Weatherford it is very likely they would say that the railroad company has a right in what they claim. And there are many people in Oregon who have a high regard for their opinions on such matters.

Mr. Ball is a man of more than ordinary ability and a good assessor (they say he gives heaped up measure in valuation) but his opinion will not be taken as conclusion in a matter of such importance to this county and to the state.

I thank you for your having taken up the discussion of this very important matter, and I believe now is the time to settle it, while interested parties are living who know about the conditions of the grant.

If the railroad company is going to own this country the sooner we know it the better—but if they do not, the people who do are doing to develop it in a manner that will give the railroads something to do, besides carrying passengers to a Summer resort.

There are great things in store for Lincoln county in the near future.
