Service. The men who are responsible for the success of the Siletz Indian Fair needs the services of all the residents of Lincoln County.

Do not neglect to accept the invitation of the Siletz Indian Fair to plan your work so that you can attend the Fair on August 23, 24, and 25, 1916.

The Publicity Committee of the Siletz Indian Fair made an extensive trip during the past week, and visited the principal Valley towns. We are indebted to the Lincoln County Leader for the boost they gave our Fair. We are also indebted to the Falls City Times, D. L. Woods & Son, publishers for the following publicity: Indian Fair, Robert R. DePoe, Alfred Lane and John Williams, Publicity Committee for the Indian Fair to be held at Siletz, Oregon, August 23, 24 and 25, were in the city Wednesday. They are endeavoring to make this fair better than ever.

The fairs held there in years gone by are said to have been very interesting and well worth any one's time to go and see. They will have many unique attractions, Indian ball games and other Indian sports. Mr. DePoe is a very interesting conversationalist and is well informed. He was educated in Kansas and is personally acquainted with many of the prominent men of Kansas and Oklahoma. Benton County Review: "Robert DePoe advertising manager of the Siletz Indian Fair passed through town Tuesday afternoon with two other members of his tribe, in the interests of the publicity campaign. 'Hiawatha' will be given by Indian characters. Various other features will make this fair an attraction worth attending. It will occur August 23, 24, and 25." Many thanks Messrs Woods, and F. S. Minshall. If you come to the fair we shall turn the keys of this town over to you. Mr. Hayden included.

The Hiawatha Troup had a rehearsal today, Tuesday, and the director announces eighty per cent preparedness. The American Indian music, native to the locality, will be used this year. An added, attractive substitution indeed. The director announces the following premier Indian stars: Pau-Puk-Kewis, Checto Charley, the greatest interpreter of the historic dances of the Siletz Tribes, Chibiabos, Daniel Jordan, the best interpreter of religious Indian music. Jagoo, William Brown, the fiery brilliant Indian orator, interpreting the Indian stories both interesting and attractive. Nakomis, Marguerite Harney, last year's star. Minnehaha, Augusta Smith, a new find.

Grand Ronde Indian Band with its full membership, will arrive on the scene Sunday, August 20, 1916.

President Walter S. Hall of the Siletz Indian Fair, and Mr. Arthur Bessell, the farmer in charge of the government work went on an inspection tour this afternoon, looking over the outlook for a good agricultural, stock and other exhibits. All indications are bright.

Oscar B. Brown, last year's Chief Marshal, has been promoted to the office assistant secretary, to assist Mr. Wolverton Orton, the busiest official on the Fair Board. Applicants are informed that this important office is vacant.

The directors of the Dramatic, Literary and Musical departments announces concerts on the evening programs by the Grand Ronde Indian Band, DePoe's Juvenile Indian Orchestra, Ladies Quartette, and other attractions which are pending closing of contracts. American Indian music will have a very important place on all the evening programs. This will alone be worth the price of admission.

The hotels, restaurants, and lunch counters all announce that no one will need to go hungry for want of something good to eat. The farming districts tributary to the Siletz Indian Fair is teeming with mighty good looking stock, poultry, gardens and everything which makes for prosperity, happiness and content. Three Rabs! for Lincoln County.

The superintendent of the needlework, Mrs. Oscar Brown, informs the correspondent that the work this year will be many and very fine and elaborate. The Indian women devoting a good many stormy evenings to this work during the winter.

General Richard H. Pratt, the founder and father of Indian education, the most distinguished authority on Indian problems living, arrived in our midst today

by special invitation of our Superintendent, Edwin L. Chalcraft. We hope that it will be an occasion of great awakening among the Indians to their vast responsibilities and duties as future American citizens. We are not informed as to his itinerary, but should he be present during the fair, the friends of the Indian Educator will ask him to address the Indians and the public on the Indian problem.

This will be our last charge to the people of Lincoln County to boost for Lincoln County and the Siletz Indian Fair. No blow your horns.
