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ORGANIZATION OF THE MONUMENTAL SOCIETY OF HARDENMAN COUNTY

A number of citizens of Hardenman met at the residence of Mrs. Roper, in Bolivar, for the purpose of organizing a "Monumental Society," the object and aims of which are to devise measures and means for erecting a shaft to the memory of the sons of Hardenman who lost their lives in the late unhappy war...

Inasmuch as we deem it a sacred duty of the living to pay some respect to the memory of those who fell in the late struggle, giving up their lives in a cause which was ours as well as their own...

Resolved, That we, the undersigned, agree to form ourselves into an organization for the purpose of bringing this object to the attention of the people of our county, and pledge each other that we will use our best energies to have erected, in Court Square in the town of Bolivar, or some other suitable place, a monument commemorative of the Confederate dead of Hardenman county.

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I. This Association shall be called the "Monumental Society of Hardenman County."

2. It shall consist of — members, and shall have a President, a Secretary, and a Treasurer. In case of sickness of the President she can delegate her authority to another.

3. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all the meetings, and to call meetings when necessary. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep a correct record of all business transacted...

4. It shall be the duty of every member to exert all their influence in every manner possible to interest all in the object of the Society, and to get subscriptions for the accomplishment of this object.

5. The object (as set forth in the resolution to which the names of the members are attached) is simply to erect a monument commemorative of the Confederate dead of Hardenman county, which shall have inscribed upon it the names of all who have fallen in battle or died in the Confederate service during the late war for Southern Independence.
