

THE ELECTION.

The result of the election throughout the State cannot be ascertained for several days to come, but we have learned enough to know that all of the large towns have given radical majorities.

We have lost our Congressman, but gained a county representative, and are in strong hopes of chronicling the fact that Hugh Kirby has beaten John Aldridge for State Senator.

At Jackson, Tenn., fifteen out of thirty-five militia voted for Etheridge. Davidson county gives Brownlow 4,000 majority.
