Where and When the New State Project Began—Memories of the Olden Time. Former Gov., near Hernando, Miss., July 17th, 1873.

I think I know the origin of the subject in your section of the country, which occurred some forty years ago.

The Boston Advertiser asserts most positively that the Federal Government—meaning, of course, Grant and his rig—will not interfere in the election for Governor of Massachusetts.

The sugar crop of Louisiana, though a little backward, promises an advance on last year's yield. Possibly 125,000 hogheads will be made.

The Narrow Gauge Railroad will soon be put under contract from Columbia to Lewisburg. The Mail hopes that the subscription will soon enable the managers to push it through to Fayetteville and feel satisfied that, with proper energy, the requisite amount of money will soon be obtained.

The crops of cotton and corn in the Middle part of the State are by no means as promising as they should be.

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Great Fire at Jackson

Last Sunday morning at about 2 o'clock a fire broke out in the frame building on the corner of LaFayette and Market streets, destroying property to the amount of \$107,000, upon which there was \$33,000 insurance.

On the 19th instant, last Saturday, the Secretary of the Board of Health officially announced the entire disappearance of cholera from Memphis.
