A NEWSY LETTER. Oden, Ark. April 9, 1888. Editor Bulletin-I was reared in old Hardeman and moved to Ark. seven years ago. Am still living and expect to as long as I can. I live 30 miles North East of Hot Springs. We have a mountainous country, and some of our up land is a little rough and rocky. But it produces well. We grow corn, cotton, wheat, oats, sorghum, potatoes, fruit and most all kinds of vegetables. Our country is pretty well stocked with horses, mules, cows, sheep, and hogs. We are so far from a R. R. that our people have not commenced dealing in blooded stock yet. Hot Springs is our nearest market; but we expect a R. R. soon through our country. The locating survey has been made, and the right-of-way given and put on record. So I think that settles it. The timber is pine and oak, mixed with Hickory, Elm and Lin, also some walnut. We have a variety of soils, gray, brown and some red. Anachata river runs through our county which gives us some good farms of bottom lands. There are several different church denominations here. Our schools are nothing to boast of. We have a 3 months free school in summer. A few high schools in towns. The mineral excitement has been very high in our county, and many thousand dollars have been spent but not much good accomplished yet. Improved land can be bought from 5 to 8 dollars per acre. There is quite a lot of government land here yet; it is mostly rough land. But has as fine timber as was ever seen. But best of all is our heat. I have been living in this county for more than five years with a large family and have not had to pay one dollar of doctor's bill. If one of my friends in old Hardeman can heat that I would be glad to here from him. I have a list of your candidates for sheriff-three cheers for Perry and Powell! Go it boys. Also the list for trustee-hurrah for Savage! You are making the Bulletin better than it has ever been. You are working for the good of the people.
