Tobacco Market.

A slight cessation of the two months rain we have had, increased our receipts of tobacco last week, and we report the offerings at 417 hogheads.

Prices were very irregular, up one day and down the next. Our buyers have struggled hard to prevent any decline in spite of the recent low sales made in New York.

Planters have generally accepted the situation, knowing that the decline is smaller here than at other points; though some have rejected the bids upon their crops, seeming to be of the impression that the long spell of wet weather will prevent the burning of plant beds in time to secure plants for the coming crop.

Prices were much better towards the last of the week, though the sales were larger.

Our market opened this week by sales on Tuesday, at the Exchange of 152 hogheads. Prices fell off somewhat from Friday's figures, but the general tone was firm and strong.

On Wednesday, Messrs. Poindexter & Co. sold 137 hogheads and two boxes. The sale opened with much animation, and prices stiffened as it progressed, and closed with an advance of 20c upon the previous days quotation.

The highest prices were \$21 00 for a box, raised by Mr. Henry Dyer, \$40 00 for a lot of yellow wrappers, raised by Mr. M. Jones of this county, and \$27 80 for a lot of bright leaf made by Mr. R. M. Moss, of Christian county, Ky.

Among the sights of the day was a beautiful sample of "Chinggon" leaf raised by Mr. P. O. Hamburg of this county. Mr. H. rejected the bid after the auctioneer had obtained an almost fabulous price.

Mr. A. Vautier, the French buyer, was anxious to secure it, to exhibit at the "Exposition, at Paris." Mr. H. has, we understand, some of the seed on hand for distribution.

We trust our merchants are beginning to feel some good results from the large amounts of money disbursed here in the past two months. As their rents and other expenses are only one-fourth as much, as in large cities, and their freights on goods only a fraction more, they can sell at lower prices than any city west of the mountains.

Messrs. Crumman & Chesnut seem to appreciate the efforts of the tobacco trade, to restore its ancient prosperity to our little city, and two weeks since, treated buyers and sellers to a handsome basket of choice liquors. They have just received large additions to their stock, and as they sell for cash and turn their money quick, they ask only a small advance on cost.

We noticed this week on our breaks, tobacco from Nashville and Louisville. The results were satisfactory to the shippers.—May we not soon hope to hear from Hertsville and Durkville? We have five buyers here waiting for those free, leafy, sweet tobaccos.
