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HOW IT WORKS.

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Pinewood Factory Burnt.

The Pinewood Mills, owned by S. L. GRAMM & SON, were destroyed by fire about 2 o'clock last Friday morning. All the machinery and a large amount of cotton was destroyed. The loss is estimated at one hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars. No insurance.

The mills were located in Hickman County, on Piney Creek, and consisted of a large cotton and wool-mill, and a grist and saw-mill.

The cotton and wool-mill was built of brick, in the most substantial manner, three stories in height. It operated over 2,000 spindles, and from 30 to 50 looms, besides carding and all the other necessary machinery used in such establishments.

About 120 persons were employed in the mill, and about one hundred were thrown out of employment.

The mill burned out weekly 7,000 yards of the best quality of four-quarter brown sheetings, besides large quantities of cotton batting, yarn, etc. It was established about twenty years ago by SAMUEL GRAMM & BROTHER, who owned several thousand acres of land around it, besides the little town which they built through the operation of the mills. The town has a church, school-house, store, hall and post-office. Every man, woman and child in the place is proud to be a citizen of the town.

Mr. GRAMM, who is a man of great ability, energy and wealth, who has been engaged in the mill, was run to the full capacity, and was doing a flourishing business.

Mr. GRAMM is a son-in-law of our esteemed fellow citizen, M. HILTS, and we believe, at one time worked at the tailoring business in this city.

He was often urged by his son, J. O. GRAMM, to leave the mill, and to go to some other business, but he was refused, saying that he was unable to insure himself. This was unwise policy, although he is able to rebuild again. He realized \$50,000 by the late raise in cotton, we learn.
