THE CONTEST AT SPRINGFIELD.
The people are much interested in the balloting for United States senator at Springfield, and eagerly devour all details. We therefore give, in full, the balloting of Monday last, in which Gen. Anderson made a gallant dash for victory. The contest opened with the twenty-fourth ballot. All the Democrats voted for Anderson excepting Senators Hanna, Kelsoe and McDowell, who with Representatives Hickey, Mooneyhan, Connelly and Williams, voted for Hanna. Representatives Dennis, Grettell, Herrington, Klema, Merritt and Sexton voted for Gouly; Wilderman for Judge Lawrence; Robinson, of Ellingham, for S. S. Marshall, and Senator Smith for Glenn.

On this balloting the result was as follows: Logan, 99; Anderson, 85; Hanna, 7; Gouly, 7; Parrish, 1; Glenn, 1; Marshall, 1; Lawrence, 1; absent, 2.

The twenty-fifth ballot resulted in a change of Senator Thompson from Gouly to Anderson. Mr. Merritt voted for Senator Kelsoe; Ramsey to Judge Marshall; Sexton for Merritt. The vote was: Logan, unchanged; Anderson, 85; Hanna, 7; Gouly, 4; Marshall, 2; scattering, 5.

The twenty-sixth ballot, Senators Hanna and Smith changed to Anderson; Representatives Merritt and Sexton changed back to Anderson; Williams changed to Brees; Dennis from Gouly to Anderson, causing applause. The vote was: Logan, unchanged; Anderson, 89; Hanna, 5; Gouly, 4; scattering, 5.

On the twenty-seventh ballot Senator Hanna changed from Anderson to Lawrence; Representative Gouly changed from Marshall to Anderson. The vote was: Logan, 88; Anderson, 90; Hanna, 5; Gouly, 3; Lawrence, 3; scattering, 3. Logan men lost all hopes of his election.

On the twenty-eighth ballot Senator Tallferro, Republican, was taken suddenly ill, and was excused from voting and paired off with Representative Reburn, Democrat, for Anderson. Representative Grettell changed back to Gouly; Herrington, Klema and Sexton, changed from Gouly to Lawrence. Ware from Anderson to Trumbull, Williams changed to Stevenson. The vote was: Logan, 97; Anderson, 87; Hanna, 3; Lawrence, 8; scattering, 5. Adjourned at 2 o'clock.

MORTON IN OPPOSITION.
Senator Morton addressed the senate on Monday in opposition to the joint committee plan of determining the presidential contest. He took the broad ground that the president of the senate had the right not only to open and count the electoral votes, but also to determine which of the votes sent up from a state should be counted. He denounced "the plan" as a cowardly retreat on the part of the Republicans; said, in his rough way, that the shadow of intimidation had fallen into the senate chamber, and that the Republicans would take "the plan," if they took it at all, as they took a dose of castor oil. He was very bitter; and, in conclusion, informed his hearers that he was not well enough to tell them at that time how much he detested the proposed settlement of the presidential questions. In his opinion Hayes, having been elected, should be inaugurated and all opposition to this act should be put down with powder and ball. A blood-deserving revolutionist this, for whom the sour apple tree that knew not Jeff. Davis is waiting patiently and with a growing hope that it will yet enjoy the sensation of his swinging body.

The women suffragists held a convention in Washington last week, and believe that they reached more substantial results than by any previous public effort made by them. Twenty-three different petitions, from twenty-three states, were presented in the house, each by a resident of the state sending the petition. The members received the petitions in a manner that showed "their good will toward the suffrage movement" and rejoiced the heart of Susan B. Anthony. The judiciary committee of the house also agreed to report in favor of allowing women to practice in all United States courts on the same conditions with men.

The striking resemblance between Mayor Winter, of this city, and Senator Oglesby, was apparent to even the casual observer, as those two gentlemen stood upon the bank of the Mississippi last Sunday, and looked at the government work being done at this place in the interest of improved navigation. It was thought by the more careful observers that the senator looked more like the mayor than the mayor looked like the senator; but we are of the opinion that this is a mistake. Evidently the mayor is more like the senator, and one is young, but both are beautiful.

MRS. GEN. SHERMAN is collecting money among the Catholics to make a present to the pope on the fiftieth anniversary of his entrance to the priesthood. Harper's Weekly, Nast, Eugene Lavigne, to the rescue! The country is in danger! This movement on the part of Mrs. Sherman in the interest of the pope and Catholics should be frowned down! This is "arkusism" of course.

JEFF BLACK expressed a great truth, apparent to every one, but denied by the machine politicians, when he said: "Either side is willing to fight it it thinks the other won't. Neither side is willing to fight it it thinks the other will." On each side there is being played a big game of bluff—a big game by little political cowards. But happily the adoption of the plan will crush the bluffers, preserve the peace and re-start the country on a prosperous career.

PRESIDENT GRANT is outspoken in his commendation of the electoral compromise bill; he has declared that he considers it a patriotic, statesmanlike and equitable proposition for the adjustment of the presidential difficulty, and that it will be impossible for members of congress, now hostile to it, to vote against it when the sentiment of the people in all sections of the country makes itself felt in Washington.

The opponents of the compromise bill in congress depend upon eleven Republican senators and two Democrats to compass the defeat of the measure in the senate. The Republican senators are Morton, Paddock, Dorsey, Ingalls, Sargent, Patterson, Burtwell, Hamlin, Cramer, West, and Morrill. The Democratic senators are Easton and Gordon.

The machine politicians of the Radical and Democratic parties are opposed to the joint commission plan of settlement, but the business men of the land and all truly patriotic citizens applaud it, and the ballot throwers will inevitably crush out the men who stand in its way.

Body continues to make a few remarks to the senate of the United States. His last speech was a short one. It ran on two days and a half, and was broken off in the middle. After a rest he will resume.

SHERMAN, the Eliza Pinkston statesman, is opposed to the plan of settlement. He is like Morton, and demands "blood, lago, blood."

J. E. BAILEY, of Clarksville, Tennessee, heretofore unknown to fame, has been elected United States senator from that state.
