A Fatal Hunt.

Another instance of the pitcher going once too often to the well has occurred in India. Captain Doig, an infantry officer, had become renowned as a tiger hunter, and the fame of his exploits had even reached Europe. He was supposed to be invincible, had performed almost fabulous feats, and was held by the natives to be a charmed life. The poor gentleman was, however, killed by a tiger early in September. He went out one day and had a brilliant success, slaying a fine tiger single handed. Four or five days after, news came that another tiger was lurking in the same place, about six miles from the camp. The new arrival began to distinguish himself by slaughtering bullocks, and Captain Doig resolved to bring his sport to an end. Unaccompanied, save by his own "Shikaries," the hunter repaired to the spot. The savage beast was soon found, and the Captain Doig got rather a long shot at him, and felt sure he had hit him in the head. His impression, however, was that the tiger had got off into the jungle not much hurt, and that he must beat again for him in a fresh quarter.

While preparing to do this, Capt. Doig being at the moment alone, the enraged animal suddenly leaped from cover, and in an instant seized his foe and bore him to the earth. Capt. Doig did not even see the onset was so swift that he never even saw the beast until he himself was on the ground, and being, as he expressed it, "calmly eaten." A horrible struggle ensued; the "Shikaries" sprang to the rescue, and the intrepid hunter actually fought himself out of the tiger's clutches, and not only that, but managed to destroy him. The encounter was nevertheless fatal. Capt. Doig lay the pluck to ride back to the camp, being lifted to a saddle for that purpose. But he never recovered from the shock and frightful laceration he received, and five days after breathed his last. For men who get celebrated for this kind of achievement its pursuit seems to have irresistible fascination, and the sad case of Capt. Doig has many precedents.

SOUTH AMERICA.—Late news from Chili is to the effect that the Government was planning a scheme to effectually occupy the Araucanian territory. Surveys were in progress for the building of new and the extension of old railroads. Peruvian advisers represent that the small-pox is ravaging in Lima. The Presidential election had resulted in favor of General Prado. There are fears that the Government will nullify the election and proclaim Gen. Echenique temporary President, with the assistance of the army, and advise the appointment of Echenique as brother Dictator. Revolt is reported to have 8,000 soldiers at his command, and will, it is believed, begin the war if the Government nullifies the vote of the people. A riot occurred in Lima during the election, in which six persons were killed and several wounded.

HOW TO PRESERVE THE FLAVOR OF BUTTER.—The *Gleaner* Agriculturalist says that a great portion of the fine flavor of fresh butter is destroyed by the usual mode of washing, and it recommends a thorough kneading for the removal of the buttermilk, and a subsequent pressing in a linen cloth. Butter thus prepared, according to our authority, is pre-eminently for its sweetness of taste and flavor, qualities which are retained a long time. To improve manufactured butter, we are advised by the same authority to work it thoroughly with fresh cold milk, and then wash it in clear water; as it is said that even old and rancid butter may be rendered palatable by washing it in water to which a few drops of a solution of chloride of lime have been added.
