THE CULTIVATION OF FOREST TREES.

The cultivation of forest trees in America is fast becoming a question of general interest and importance. In Europe necessity compelled governments years ago to offer special inducements for the cultivation of forests, and England and Scotland to-day boast of thousands of acres of pines, oaks and larches.

The subject attracts attention in the United States not only because in certain sections of the country timber is becoming scarce, but also for the influence of forests upon the climate and healthfulness of the country.

We see it stated that the city of Denver was built upon one of these parched plains and that now a running stream passes through it which it has been found necessary to bridge.

The rapid denudation of some of the heavier timber regions by the enterprising lumbermen has alarmed many thinking persons and caused much discussion as to the policy of beginning at once to encourage not only the cultivation of forest trees, but to restrain, as far as practicable, the great waste of valuable timber annually taking place.

In this connection it is well enough to suggest what has seemed to us important to the South, and that is whether or not the gradual change going on in the character of our forests will not in due time make radical changes in our soil.

It is a fact well known, we suppose, that all through the South wherever the pine forests are cut down, oak forests spring up in their place. It has seemed to us that from these oak forests the annual contributions of vegetable matter to the soil must in time make the changes above suggested—one in its final results to affect materially the character of our agriculture.

THE NEW ORLEANS TROUBLE.

The contest in New Orleans is between the Reform Republicans, or "Custom House," "Grant" party, as they are called, and the adherents of Warmoth.

In the Senate the Reform Republicans have absented themselves and left fifteen Warmoth Senators without a quorum. In the House the Reform Republicans endorse Speaker Carter, and on Tuesday voted him a resolution of thanks.

The struggle, we judge from our dispatches, is not yet ended. The Governor seems determined to coerce the Legislature to act as he desires. Of the merits of the conflict, we give the following from the New Orleans Times concerning the Grant-Reform Republicans: "The prospect of reformatory legislation has visibly brightened since the assembling of the Legislature.

The Radical wing opposed to the present administration of our State government not only declares itself, in the most emphatic manner, in favor of the repeal of the obnoxious laws which have been enacted to aggrandize and autocratize the State Executive; it not only has carefully prepared bills to sweep from the Statute books such infamies as the election, the militia, the metropolitan police, and other acts of like import and character and import, but it is obviously the interest and sound policy of that party to carry through these several reforms without regard to other political consequences.

E. A. Straw was nominated for Governor. Senator Wilson made a speech endorsing the administration of President Grant as honest, patriot and economical.
