mad career. Whilst on this subject we give the following extract from a speech of Maj. W. J. Sykes, at Columbia, last summer.

"Suppose we refuse to settle the debt of the State upon the ground that the slaves were emancipated, that the debt is held mainly by Northern men, and that the Congress of the United States does not legislate in a manner to suit us, but, as we believe, detrimental to the best interests of the country?"

"What do you think you will have upon the elections which are to take place in the Northern States this fall? Will not our refusal to settle this debt in a satisfactory manner be regarded as an evidence of our disloyalty of our still cherishing feelings of sectional hatred, and will it not be said that our conduct in this matter makes good the charge that we desire to destroy the credit of the National Government by repudiating the national debt?"

"The idea that anything we may do towards the non payment of our debts will force them to adopt our policy is entirely ridiculous. If every Southern State were to refuse to pay either the interest or principal of their public debts it would have no influence in contributing the section of Congress. As we might one of us who would a bank debt of fifty dollars in respect to control the policy of the bank by refusing to pay that debt as to expect the great money power, as it is called, to change its policy because the South and States refuse to pay their public debts, they might even be glad if we would do it because it would give them arguments to use, and furnish them with weapons which might be directed against us. Already a leading man, Senator Cameron, in an article in the May-June number of the North American Review has said that 'the history of their (the South's) financial action has been a continuous chronicle of bad faith with their creditors. When these things are done in all the Southern States as separate communities, what can we expect should the South obtain control of the finances of the United States?"

"Shall we make true his wholesale charge? Shall we furnish the weapons which are to destroy us? It is because I am anxious for the success of the Democratic party in the fall elections, and for the right election of a man that I am opposed to any measure which I think will strengthen the Republican party. Let us do what is right, let us stand by our contract, let us do justice to all men in the same way as we do in the South, let us make no sectional distinctions and let us attempt to arouse no sectional animosities; let us proclaim in sincerity and good faith that we intend to stand by all amendments to the Constitution, and that the one which says 'in the vicinity of the national debt shall never be questioned,' and then we can go before the people of the whole country, North and South, and ask for such systems of finance, such measures of policy, and such a course of improvement, as will do justice to all and be injurious to none."

GEN. J. R. HAWLEY, of Connecticut, has written a letter formally placing himself in the field as a candidate for the United States Senate. He puts it in this way: "The State has a right to command the services of all, and it may be said of this responsible and honorable office, as it has been of the Presidency of the State of Tennessee, that the candidate, while it is not to be sought in the hearts of scheming politicians, neither is it to be lightly declined. If it comes to me, it will come as did the nomination for the House. If the General Assembly, on the final meeting of the whole argument, should see fit to honor me with the Senatorship, it would probably be with the approval of the members from this Congressional District, and the district would expect me to accept it with gratitude."
