From the East Tennesseean we learn that Green Kearley, W. W. Kearley and Frank Tollett, three of the prisoners who recently escaped from the Maryville jail, were captured last Wednesday by Constable Ragan and Bill Rains, near Clark's ferry, at Kingston. There were all Federal Court prisoners. There were seven of the prisoners who escaped. One was captured the next day; the other three are still out of pocket, so far as we can learn.

Look Out for Him.

He has a habit of frequently changing his name. His height is about five feet ten inches, red complexion, heavy moustache, upper front tooth out and rather hollow eyed.

Business Interests Looking Up.

There has been a very noticeable and gratifying improvement in the outlook in business circles of most all branches in Knoxville during the past week or two. Our leading wholesale mercantile establishments give marked evidence from day to day of a live and steadily increasing trade. The employees all seem to be kept busy, their front pavements are kept filled daily with boxes, packages, etc., either being received or shipped away, and many other business-like evidences.

The retail men seem to be doing a healthy business, and in most other lines there is a picking up and improvement, so that on the whole everything points to the fact that the bottom has been reached in financial depression, and that the spring trade opens out with buoyant and encouraging prospects of better times coming.

THE LIQUOR LAW.

It prohibits the sale of liquors on Sunday or to minors.

The following is a text of the bill to amend sections 4861 and 4863 of the Code, which passed its third reading in the House of Representatives at Nashville Wednesday:

"That no licensed grocer, or druggist, or other person in this State, shall retail spirits, vinous fermented liquors, wine, ale or beer, or any other intoxicating liquor, on Sunday, either by himself, agent, clerk or other person, except by way of prescription of some practicing physician, and, if any physician shall give a certificate to any person, except for medical purposes, he shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and subject to such fine as the court may fix."

"That section 4863 of the Code be so amended as to read, that any person who sells, gives or delivers to any minor, any of the liquors specified in the preceding section, without a written permit from the parent, guardian or other person having the care of such minor, is guilty of a misdemeanor, except as provided for in the first section, and that as the penalty for a violation of this act or any part of it the parties so offending shall be fined \$25 and imprisoned in the county jail for ten days."

A Tribune in our School Directors.

Editor—In last week's Knoxville comic, headed "The School Directors—a question of Veracity," which, as a citizen of the school district, I would like to reply to. Since the subject is assumed to be of importance it is no more than right that the public should hear both sides.

The question at issue, Mr. Editor, is "teacher" or "no teacher" in our public school. The teacher, one John N. Parker (which is a fanatical quaker from North Carolina) along with 9-tenths of the community, was opposed to letting the children be taught by a teacher, while the directors said they must have a teacher, and 3 boys, out of 90 scholars, concluded to chaw. Then they were a hitch, and the directors dismissed the teacher for "bulldozin' the community and denyin' the right of the 3 boys to chaw. But, instead of takin' his walkin' pants, the teacher kept rite on and finished his term, as he said, according to contract, and the wishes of the people. What a task, wood becom uv our bosted liberty of school children was deprived uv their rite to chaw? Didn't Geo. Washington, Gen. Poor Memphis! how mi hart bleeds for the skool children there, now that they will not be allowed to buy a drink uv wisky. It was a crewel and tyrannical legislation which made it unlawful to sell wisky withiu 4 miles uv a college, except in incorporated cities, and the boys uv Memphis will hev to suffer like sum other country children. O tyranny! wat liberty is takin' with this name. But revenous a nos motions. I like thet fraze, tho I don't agree uv kno the meaning uv it, but I reckon its uthin about sheep. Our Directors, which is all gentillmen and skollars, person to kno wat the rite uv boys is, regardless uv a North Carolina quaker, the parties of the rest uv the people; and in upholdin' those rites they will carri thet teacher banner onto victory or into the Sumpren court. Oh, they is herelek school trustees, and long after the people who sined those pitious shet hev sunk into their meriyd oblivion, the names uv our Directors will shine abo onto a tablet of gloe—ossibly by faxation, outnattered by glee—uv the immortal names that was not born to die.
