THE EAST.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Feb. 18.—Measures are being taken to occupy the territory evacuated by the Russians. Orders have been given for seven battalions of the Turkish troops to advance from Tchahaldja lines in the direction of Adrianople. A portion of two regiments of gendarmes, which are to be ready by the first of March, will likewise be sent into that province. The gendarmes will be under English and French officers. The Russian army train was to begin moving from Adrianople towards Bourga's to-day February 18th.

TELEGRAPHIC.

A Resolution to Submit the Bondholders' Proposition to the People.

A Large Number of New Bills Introduced in the House.

One to Make Radical Change in the Judicial Circuits.

Fatal Accident on the Selma, Rome and Dalton Railroad.

General Superintendent Stanton Supposed to be Fatally Injured.

The Revenue Bill Finally Passed after Numerous Amendments.

NASHVILLE, TENN., Feb. 18.

In the Senate the bill giving County Courts the power to appoint Coal Oil Inspectors was rejected for the lack of a Constitutional majority.

To protect lives and limbs on railroads, was passed on the third reading.

In the House Mr. Hall offered a resolution providing for the submission to the people for their ratification the proposition, if made by the bondholders, to settle the State debt at 50 cents, with four per cent. interest, which lies over.

Thirty new bills were introduced, among which was one by Mr. Bearden to change the name of East Tennessee University to University of Tennessee, and one by Mr. Manson to re-district the State into Judiciary Districts and Chancery Divisions. It provides for twenty-one Judicial Circuits, of which circuits the Judges are to act as Chancellors, the election to occur in August, 1879, and the Judges elect to take charge of the circuits September 1st, the Judge to devote two-thirds of his time to jury cases and one-third to Chancery business. On this subject a majority of the special committee appointed to investigate its expediency reported this change expedient, a constitutional minority report, signed by Hawkins, Anderson and Butler, containing an adverse opinion.

XLV CONGRESS.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.

Senator Windom presented the resolutions of the Colored Western Emigration Society, of Charleston, S. C., favoring his resolution in regard to the migration of the colored people. They were laid on the table.

Senator Hear called up the resolution to pay Joseph Segar \$5,000, in full compensation for his expenses in prosecuting his claim to a seat in the Senate as Senator from the State of Virginia in 1863. It was agreed to by a vote of yeas, 24; nays, 26.

The Senate resumed the discussion of the bill to amend the Revenue laws, the pending question being an amendment to tax tea ten cents per pound and coffee two and one-half cents per pound. A division of the question was ordered. The vote was taken on taxing tea ten cents per pound, and it was rejected by yeas, 21; nays, 47. The amendment to tax coffee two and one-half cents per pound was rejected without a division. An amendment increasing the tax on tobacco from 16 to 20 cents per pound was rejected by a vote of yeas, 21; nays, 42. An amendment to exempt from certain provisions of the existing law small distilleries whose daily capacity does not exceed 30 gallons was agreed to. An amendment allowing a drawback on all manufactured tobacco upon which the tax of 24 cents per pound has been paid by suitable revenue stamps equal in amount to the difference between the value of such stamps at 24 cents per pound and the value of such stamps at any reduced rate fixed by act of Congress was rejected. The Senate agreed to the amendment that the act take effect the 1st of May, instead of the 1st of April, as proposed by the committee. After other amendments the bill passed.

The Postal Appropriation bill comes up as unfinished business to-morrow.

Resolutions of respect to the

memory of the late Representatives Schleicher and Quinn were adopted, and the Senate adjourned.

HOUSE.  
The House refused to consider the reports from the Committee of Ways and Means, or to proceed with the Legislative Appropriation bill, and is now [at noon] in Committee of the Whole for the consideration of the Census bill.

The House went into Committee of the Whole on the Census bill, the first amendment transferring the power of appointing supervisors from the Secretary of the Interior to the Governors of the several States, with an amendment so as to provide that if any Governor shall fail to make the nominations of Supervisors before the first of April, 1880, the Secretary of the Interior shall make such appointments, which was agreed to without further action, when the House took a recess.

To-night's session is for the discussion of the Legislative, Executive and Judicial appropriation bill.

WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—The Cabinet to-day discussed the bill for restricting Chinese immigration, but there was no indication as to whether the President would sign or veto the measure. The cattle plague was also given attention, and it was deemed advisable to request Congress to enact laws forbidding the shipment of diseased cattle from American ports, and thus prevent discrimination by England or other countries against our cattle export trade.

Thomas C. Dunn, who was one of the South Carolina Returning Board, has been before the Potter Committee to-day and yesterday. His general statements are to the effect that he never made any negotiations with Hardy Solomon for the sale of the vote of the Returning Board. He affirmed that the matter was earnestly pressed upon him, but while he did not wish to vaunt his virtue, he declared he could not be bought by even the munificent offers made him.

NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 18.—The Texas parish cases have been continued until Wednesday, on the application of the counsel for the defense.

COLUMBIA, S. C., Feb. 18.—A fire last night, at Newberry, S. C., destroyed an entire block of business houses, and five other blocks were badly damaged. Loss, \$60,000, partly covered by insurance.

LIVERPOOL, Feb. 18.—The bark Maiden City, Capt. Berryman, 20 days from Norfolk, Va., arrived here yesterday.

REIGNITION OF JUDGE ANDREWS.  
The resignation of Judge Andrews, as District Attorney for the Eastern District of Tennessee, who is the head of with some parties, though we have known that he has completed such a step for some time past, has been made a faithful offer, always regarding the unpleasant position faithfully and non-sty. He has, however, guarded the interests of the Government without conceding the wishes of his friends. There are reports of his resignation, but the matter is not settled.
