State Medical Society.

The State Medical Society met in Nashville Tuesday last with a good representation from different portions of the State, and organized for business. The most interesting proceedings of Wednesday was the handsome tribute to the memory of the forty-two physicians who fell at the point of duty in the late yellow fever epidemic in Memphis, which was presented and adopted.

A communication was read from the Knox County Medical Society, requesting the next meeting of the Society to be held in Knoxville, and the invitation was accepted.

The Society proceeded to the election of officers for the ensuing year, with the following result:

President—Dr. E. M. Wight, of Hamilton.

Vice Presidents—For East Tennessee, Dr. B. B. Lenoir, of Knox; for Middle Tennessee, Dr. N. F. Tucker, of Davidson; for West Tennessee, Dr. G. B. Thornton, of Shelby.

Recording Secretary—Dr. Ambrose Morrison, of Davidson.

Permanent Secretary—Dr. J. Berrien Lindsey, of Davidson.

Treasurer—Dr. J. D. Plunket, of Davidson.

An Unfailing Evidence of Good Taste.

The Supreme Court Commission.

Our readers are aware that Gov. Marks has appointed by authority of an act of the Legislature, three eminent lawyers in each division of the State as Supreme Court Commissioners or Courts of Arbitration.

Said Commissioners are to take the oath of office, the same as Supreme Judges, select one of their number to act as Chief Commissioner, and in case of the incompetency of one of them in a case, the others shall sit. They shall appoint an officer and conduct it in the Supreme Court. They are to be paid at the rate of \$3,000 per year for the number of days actually at work.

The Commission for the Eastern Division is to sit in Knoxville, beginning the first Monday in December, 1879, to remain until March 1, 1880, or until the business on the civil docket is disposed of. The Middle Division Commission meets in Nashville the first Monday in May, 1879, and that of the Western Division in Jackson the same date.

They will only hear and report upon such civil cases as the parties or their attorneys, or solicitors, may submit to said Commission, consent to being presumed, unless objections thereto be filed in writing in the various causes ten days before the meeting of said Courts of Arbitration.

Their reports are to be submitted to special terms of the Supreme Court at Nashville the first Monday in November, 1879, at Jackson on the first of September, 1879, and in Knoxville the first Monday of March, 1880. Said reports and conclusions are to become judgments and decrees of the Supreme Court, when approved by said court, but no opinion of said Commission shall be published in the reports of the decisions of the Supreme Court, nor shall the same have any further or other effect than to determine the particular causes where rendered, and shall be of no force, or effect, or authority, as precedent in other cases.

Another Dividend for the Commercial Bank Creditors.

A decree was rendered by Chancellor Staley in the Chancery Court yesterday in the famous suit of W. G. Home et al vs. The Commercial Bank, declaring another dividend of four per cent to all the legally recognized creditors of that defunct banking institution. This is the second dividend that has been declared, seven per cent having been paid to them soon after the litigation began, and makes, in all, eleven per cent of their debts received, at least will be when this last dividend is paid over.

There are still some other effects to be converted into assets as fast as they can by legal process.
