Postal Information Sought.

To enable the Department to compile a list of local names of places which are not postoffices, towns, etc., where local names or names by which they are generally known are not the same as those of the postoffices at which their mail is received, all postmasters have been directed by the Postmaster General to report to the "First Assistant Postmaster General, United States Official Postal Guide," a list of all such names of places, etc., within the delivery of their post-offices. Managers of railroad and steamboat lines are requested to furnish the Department with a list of their stations and landings, with the names of the postoffices at which their mail is received.—National Republican.
