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

A Stalwart and Rebounding Boom For 1880.

THE ELECTIONS.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.—The New York Tribune telegraphs at midnight: "We have returns from one hundred and eight towns in this State for Governor, in which Cornell is 11,141 plurality. The Republicans last year had 16,010 in the same towns. At this rate Cornell's plurality, outside of New York and Brooklyn, will be about 50,000, and he will be elected by about 80,000. In fifty-three towns the remainder of the ticket loses more than 200 on last year's plurality, so that it will probably have about 68,000 plurality outside of New York and Brooklyn, and is elected by a small majority. The returns now coming in from the country are more favorable to the State ticket."

At 11 p. m. the estimate of the New York Tribune received here is, that Robinson has about eleven thousand plurality in the city and ten thousand in Brooklyn. In the remainder of the State Cornell's plurality is about thirty-three thousand and this insures Cornell's election by about sixteen thousand. The Republican State ticket is in doubt.

Hoskins, for Lieutenant-Governor, on the Republican ticket, runs far ahead of Cornell, and it looks as if he might wipe out most, if not all of the Democratic vote, of between forty and fifty thousand in the city. The scratching on the local ticket is so great that the result will not be known till very late.

Boston reports Butler as conceding his defeat by nine thousand. Most of the other reports place it at from ten to fifteen thousand.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—Fifty city election districts give Cornell, 3,405; Robinson, 3,907; Kelly, 2,840; Hoskins, 3,462; Potter, 6,857.

MASSACHUSETTS. BOSTON, Mass., Nov. 4.—The full vote of this city gives Butler a majority of 3,675 over all, a gain of 719 for Butler over last year. Nineteen towns in various parts of the State give Long 2,733 majority over Butler.

Eighty-three towns and ten cities, including Boston, give Long 3,234 majority over Butler.

One hundred and eleven towns and cities give Long 62,116; Butler, 55,672; Adams, 4,550. Last year's vote: Talbot, 68,198; Butler, 56,375; Abbott, 4,990.

One hundred and thirty-seven towns and sixteen cities give Long 6,504 majority over Butler.

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FREDERICKSBURG, Nov. 4.—The election here to-day excited great interest, but was quiet. The debt-payers have carried the county and Senatorial district by a large majority.

AN ADJOINING DISTRICT THE REPORTS indicate the defeat of General Fitz Hugh Lee, by Duff Green, Readjuster. A remarkable incident to-day was the appearance of a large body of colored voters, with file and drum, following the Virginia flag. They voted for the debt-payers' candidate.

PETERSBURG, Nov. 4.—Considering the great interest and anxiety manifested here during the State debt canvass, the election to-day has been one of the most orderly and friendly that Petersburg has witnessed for years. No disturbance of any kind has occurred, and the best of feeling existed between the debt-payers and the Readjusters.

BALTIMORE, Nov. 5.—1:30 a. m.—Up to this hour full returns have been received from only three of twenty wards of this city. These three wards give a Democratic majority of 1,792. Owing to the length of the ticket, which includes the State Legislature and Judicial officers, and general scratching, the count will not be concluded before morning. The Democratic majority in the city will be about 10,000. Few of the counties have been heard from. Harford is reported 1,600 Democratic majority, and Howard county 500. There is no question of the election of the Democratic State ticket and Democratic Legislature.

MINNESOTA. ST. PAUL, Minn., Nov. 4.—Returns come in slowly, only a few small precincts being received. These indicate a much smaller vote than two years ago, and the majorities proportionally reduced. It is not likely the average majority on the State ticket will much exceed 10,000. Some few precincts in the southern portion of the State, where the bulk of the vote is cast, show large Republican gains. In St. Paul Rice (Dem.) for Governor is running ahead of his ticket, and will have a large majority, probably 1,600.

VICKSBURG, Miss., Nov. 4.—The election is quiet but little will be known of the result before morning. Hinds will probably elect the greater part of the Greenback ticket. Yazoo is Democratic.

JACKSON, Nov. 4.—The election is very quiet. A small vote is polled. The returns are light. We can not judge of the result, though it is expected that the Democrats will carry the State, with the exception of a few counties.

ILLINOIS. CHICAGO, Nov. 4.—The election to-day was quiet and peaceable. A full vote was polled, though it is expected that the Democrats will carry the State, with the exception of a few counties.

NEBRASKA. LINCOLN, Nov. 4.—11:30 p. m.—The election returns come in slowly. The indications are that Cobb, Republican candidate for Supreme Judge, is elected over Wakely, Democrat, by 13,000 majority. The total vote of the State will reach 60,000. The Republican county tickets are generally successful. The Greenbackers make a very small showing.

NEW JERSEY. NEWARK, N. J., Nov. 4.—The Republicans have gained one State Senator in New Jersey, and probably five or six members of the Assembly. They will retain control of both branches of the Legislature, the Senate by a majority of 3 and the Assembly probably by 14 or 16 majority.

MISSOURI. ST. LOUIS, Nov. 4.—Dispatches from points in southwestern Missouri and southeastern Kansas report the killing of Jesso James, of the notorious James boys, supposed to have been one of the gang which robbed the train at Glendale, Mo., recently by Geo. Shepperd, formerly a member of the same gang. Shepperd joined James, who, with a party, was on the road to Texas. After riding with them some distance, Shepherd suddenly shot James in the head, wheeled his horse and fled, escaping with a shot in the thigh from one of James' companions. Shepherd cherished an enmity against James for killing a relative of his.

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MINOR DISPATCHES. SAVANNAH, Ga., Nov. 4.—The Atlantic and Gulf Railroad was sold to-day under decree of the United States Court, for three hundred thousand dollars, over the first mortgage and other claims, to H. B. Plant. The purchase money has already been paid.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—The remains of General Hooker have arrived and will be in state in the Governor's room at the City Hall until to-morrow, under guard of United States troops.

PORTLAND, Me., Nov. 4.—A schooner, name unknown, went ashore last night at Broad Cove, Cape Elizabeth, and went to pieces. The crew were all drowned. Owing to the heavy sea no assistance could be rendered, although the vessel was plainly visible from the shore. She appeared to be ice laden, as much sawdust floated out. It is reported that five bodies were washed ashore.

HALIFAX, Nov. 4.—The war-ship Pyramus, which was captured by Admiral Nelson from the Danes in one of his famous engagements, and which served as a training ship here, has been sold for \$7,000.

FOREIGN NEWS. LONDON, Nov. 4.—A Rome dispatch says that the Vatican will shortly send a Charge de Affairs to Turkey to carry out the convention about Bosnia, after which an inter-turcic and several Bishops are to be appointed.

A Renter Sophia telegram says that owing to the strong opposition to the Cabinet in the Assembly the Bulgarian Ministry have resigned, but that Prince Alexander has not accepted their resignations.

The liabilities of Calvin Comis & Co., on this side, are moderate, but their indebtedness in India is believed to be heavy, the firm having acted as bankers for civil service and army officials, on whom the greatest loss will fall.

A farmer can not work his farm safely without knowing all about his soil. Every field should be studied as to the effects of certain methods with fertilizers upon it. Then the owner can act with reasonable certainty. The plan of experimenting with fertilizers should be followed up in successive years, until the character of each field is known. This is the best season to experiment upon fall crops and no time should be lost if it is to be done; a year will thus be saved.

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
