THE STRAWBERRY PLAINS ROBBERY.

A Cinc to the merchants who went through Borches' Store.

Mr. J. W. Borches, of Strawberry Plains, whose store was robbed of about \$500 some time since, accompanied by Sheriff Reeder, came up on Tuesday night's train from a trip to Athens, Cleveland and other points down the road, during which trip they have without a doubt obtained a pretty good clue to the perpetrators of the robbery, which, if properly followed up, will lead no doubt to their ultimate capture.

At Athens, last Monday, a white man passing by the name of Thomas was arrested for stealing some money at that place, and events that came to light pointed to him as one of the Strawberry Plains burglars. Accordingly Mr. Borches was telegraphed for and went down, as has been stated by us. Upon investigation he found unmistakable evidence of the man Thomas' connection with the burglary; in fact, the safe key and a lot of copper cents, which were taken, 131 in number, were found on him. Thomas explained that another fellow who was with him, who eluded the grasp of the Athens authorities, and whose name we could not ascertain, was the guilty party, and had only put these things in his (Thomas') possession. It may be partially true, but there is strong suspicion that if Thomas wasn't concerned in and connected with the robbery, he knows all about it.

The other fellow, who made his escape, was seen to burn a lot of the Jefferson county scrip, which was stolen from Borches, saying that it was counterfeit and he could make no use of it. The case is in competent hands, is being worked up, and will no doubt lead to the arrest of all the parties concerned.
