GARFIELD'S POWER.

A Thrilling Incident in New York. From The Cincinnati Gazette.

The following reminiscence of General Garfield's power during the greatest crisis the country ever passed through, has been furnished us by a distinguished gentleman who was present, and shows the intellectual and moral power of the republican nominee for the presidency over a surging and maddened crowd.

"I shall never forget the first time I saw General Garfield. It was the morning of the late of the government, and the country was excited to its utmost tension, and New York City seemed ready for the scenes of the French revolution. The insurrection of Lincoln's name had been fanned by the press over the whole land, and newspaper headlines of the treason were set up in the largest type, and the high crime was on every tongue.
