He was committed to jail to await a hearing at the next term of supreme court, to which he has taken an appeal.

MUNICIPAL AFFAIRS.

Proceedings of the City Council Last Night.

The Board met as usual last night Mayor Branner presiding, and the following aldermen present: McAffry, Hudburg, Sullivan, Hooker, Burrier, Irvin, Atkins, Allison, Michaels, O'Conner, Caldwell, McCroskey. The minutes were read and approved. Mayor Branner presented statement of W. H. Swan, trustee, with the corporation of Knoxville, for the year 1878, showing a balance due on taxes of that year of \$690 98, which was received and ordered spread of record. R. L. Galt, who was present, asked the 80 feet of curbing he laid on the north side of Pine street, on Summit hill. Ordered laid on motion of Alderman Michaels. G. M. Harrill asked that a fine of \$5.00 assessed against one of his drivers for running into a dray be remitted. On motion of Alderman McCroskey the fine was remitted. The following bills were presented by Alderman Allison, chairman of the finance committee, properly approved and passed for payment: T. A. Burrier, \$1.50; G. Miller & Co., \$1.10; B. Luttrell, \$2.71; E. W. Atkins, bills of costs, \$152.45; Edgington & Co., \$84.75; J. J. Riddle, \$25.20; Alderman Mackey presented the report of the market master for the month of July, showing that his receipts during that month were from stall rents \$173; city scales fees \$49.50; total, \$222.50; less salaries, \$67, leaving net receipts of \$155.50. As to the matter of building a classroom at each of the Hampden Sidney and Austin school buildings, Chairman Mackey reported for himself against the matter, but four others of the committee were for it. On motion the matters asked for were ordered constructed. Alderman McCroskey offered an ordinance levying a tax for the year 1880 of one and one-half per centum on all taxable property, and a poll tax of one dollar. The ordinance also provides to appropriate out of the assessment \$12,000 to the interest on the public debt, \$4,000 to the debt due the University of Tennessee, \$9,000 to the support of the public schools of the city, the remainder to be applied to the general expenses. Alderman Dickson moved to amend by making the tax one and one-tenth per cent, or \$1.10 on the \$100, the same as the tax levied in 1879. Speeches were made by Aldermen Dickson, Sullivan and Mackey in favor of the low tax, and by Aldermen Allison, Burrier, McAffry and Allison opposing the increase of taxation. On motion of Alderman Dickson the ordinance was ordered to be read a second time, and the following result: Aye—Dickson, Irvin, Mackey, Murphy, O'Conner, Sullivan—6. No—Allison, Atkins, Burrier, Caldwell, Hadburg, Hooker, McAffry, McCroskey, Michaels—8. Thus the amendment was lost. The original ordinance levying a tax of \$1.50 on the \$100, was then passed on first reading and goes over to the next meeting. The ayes and noes on this question were as follows: Aye—Allison, Atkins, Burrier, Caldwell, Hadburg, McAffry, McCroskey, Michaels—8. No—Dickson, O'Conner, Sullivan—7. The ordinance introduced by Alderman Allison fixing a privilege tax of \$20 and no more on livery stables, was passed on second reading and becomes a law. Alderman Dickson brought up his ordinance allowing hucksters to sell at all hours of the day, but it was lost on second reading by a vote of 12 to 2. Aldermen Dickson and McAffry voted aye. A motion of Alderman Burrier to construct a rock walk from the north end of the market house to the city scales for market wagons to back up on each side, was lost. Alderman Allison read on the second reading the ordinance granting the right of way for the Tennessee river bridge on the south end of Gay street, and it was passed and becomes a law. Adjourned.

We now produce a sworn statement from the gentleman who voted that ballot, which sets the matter at rest and shows that Mr. Anderson's friends have been obtaining an impossibility. It is as follows: Knoxville, Tenn., Aug 14, 1880. This is to certify that at an election opened and held in the first ward of the City of Knoxville, on the 5th day of August, 1880, for the purpose of electing a sheriff and trustees for Knox county, and two constables for the first district, that I voted for a trustee and two constables, but did not vote for sheriff. 
