Adjournment of Supreme Court. After a session of ten weeks in this city, the supreme court was brought to an adjournment about noon yesterday. One or two cases were disposed of in the forenoon, the most important of which was that of Martin Wilson and J. T. Wilson, brought up from Claiborne county for grand larceny and sentenced to three years in the penitentiary. The judgment of the court below was affirmed.

A brief space of time was then given, the record completed and properly signed up, and court adjourned till court in course, which is the first Monday in September, 1881.

During the session all the judges have been constant in their attendance and zealous in their labors, but were unable to clean up the docket. The court heard and disposed of about 400 cases, and there yet remain over 200 on the docket. The court will meet in Nashville the first Monday in December.

That New Line to Knoxville and the South. Cincinnati Times-Star: Reports from Louisville indicate a flourishing condition of the new southern railroad proposition, and that there is little doubt of its being carried forward to completion. A meeting was held in Louisville a few days since, at which representatives of the three lines—the Kentucky Central, the Louisville and Nashville and the Kentucky and Ohio—were present. The results were very satisfactory to all parties, and there it is expected that the details will be agreed upon, and work begun at an early day. The work when begun will be pushed with great rapidity. Men will be put on all parts of the line to be completed, and no possible time lost. The point at which the Kentucky Central will cross the Kentucky river has not yet been fixed. There will be some quite heavy tunnelling on some portions of the line which will require some amount of work, but it is probable that the line will be open for business during the coming year.
