TRAGEDY AT THE RACES.

Bony Craig Run Over and Seriously Injured by a Race Horse.

The second heat of the second race at the races on the old fair ground track yesterday evening terminated with a tragedy, the final result of which can not yet be known. Mr. T. L. Craig, "Bony," as he is familiarly known, who is Sheriff Gossett's jailer, was standing on the outer edge of the course at the judges' stand, together with others, and the excitement being very high, and as Marsh Walker's mare came in on the home stretch, he was struck, born down and run over by her. Considerable excitement and alarm was created thereby, and it was found that Mr. Craig was badly hurt. James Isom, who was near by, came to the city immediately and summoned Drs. Carriger and Dederick to attend the wounded man. He was found to have some severe gashes about the mouth and face, besides other bruises about the body, and was rendered insensible from the start.

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MUNICIPAL AFFAIRS.

Proceedings of the City Council Last Night.

The board met as usual last night, Mayor Branner presiding, and the following aldermen present: Allison, Atkins, Michaels, Hudiburg, McAffry, Boyd, Sullivan, McCroskey, O'Conner, Murphy, Burrier, Hockerjos, Mackey, Caldwell, Irvin. The minutes were read and approved.

Mr. J. H. Cruz was sworn and admitted as alderman from the third ward, as successor to City Attorney Mel. H. Dickson, recently resigned as alderman. Alderman Cruz was placed on the same committee.

The following bills were read by Alderman Allison, chairman of the finance committee, properly approved and passed for payment:

The bill of C. A. Mitchell for \$30 for taking care of the town clock for six months up to November 1st, was read out some discussion as to the condition of the clock, and was finally ordered paid.

A communication from Martin Shea was read, asking for some action as to interest on bonds held by him to the amount of \$6,000. Mr. Burrier, on behalf of Alderman Allison the recorder was instructed to set apart \$100 every six months, of such monies as come into his hands, for the purpose of meeting this interest.

Alderman O'Conner, chairman of the fire and police committee, read the report of Chief of Police Harper for the months of September and October, which shows that there were 58 arrests, 55 males and 3 females. Amount of fines and costs assessed \$336.40, collected \$209.90.

Alderman Murphy, of the gas committee reported on the gas meter and lighter of \$25.05 up to the 5th of November. He stated that there were a great many complaints of neglect in lighting lamps. The committee recommended a deduction of \$2.23 and the passage of the bill. Adopted.

Alderman McCroskey offered again for second reading the ordinance exempting all manufacturing establishments who come to Knoxville with a capital of \$5,000 and upwards; together with an amendment providing that when an establishment is started competing with another or others in the city, those of the latter shall also be relieved from the taxation.

This amendment was offered by a number of aldermen, and on motion of Alderman McCroskey, the matter was referred to the following committee for investigation: Mr. Burrier, McCroskey, Atkins and Allison.

Alderman Atkins offered an ordinance providing that it shall be incompetent for the board of mayor and aldermen to sell or otherwise dispose of the \$100,000 stock in the Knoxville and Ohio railroads, or any part of the city of Knoxville at less than 100 cents on the dollar, unless it be submitted to a vote of the people, in the same manner as when the stock was purchased. The ordinance was passed on first reading, and on motion of Mr. Burrier, the ordinance was referred to a committee for consideration.

The report of the special committee on the question of the discharge of Andrew Manson from the street force by Boss Badgett was read, and Alderman O'Conner, chairman, stated that the committee met twice but failed to get Mr. Badgett before them, and that Manson, as it appeared to them, had been discharged without any apparent cause, having been in the employ of the city for a number of years. Mr. Badgett refused to appear before the committee. On these grounds Alderman O'Conner moved to reinstate Manson.

Alderman Burrier and Sullivan said Manson was discharged for inefficiency, as they understood it. Alderman Irvin stated that Mr. Badgett told Manson it was not for inefficiency, and other statements in reference to the matter.

After considerable discussion the eyes and noses were taken, and the motion to reinstate Manson lost by the following vote: Ayes—Hudiburg, Hockerjos, Irvin, O'Conner, 4. Noes—Allison, Atkins, Burrier, Boyd, Caldwell, Mackey, McAffry, McCroskey, Michaels, Murphy, Sullivan, Cruz—12.

A petition was read from W. T. Monday charging that he had been brutally assaulted by Officer Rufus Hicks, from personal grounds, and asking for the appointment of a committee to investigate the matter. No action was taken.

Alderman Mackey moved that curbing be laid in front of Mrs. R. R. Bearden's new house on Fifth avenue, and also a street crossing. Carried.

Alderman Atkins moved to have the Market house roof painted with the "Elastic Roof paint" made and sold by air. T. P. Scarborough. Carried.

Alderman Atkins moved to confer police powers on the watchman at Craig & Rouser's saw mill. No action, it being argued that the board could confer no such powers. Adjourned.

The Cincinnati Gazette of Wednesday, under the head of "A Tennessee Tragedy," the following among its regular press telegrams: KNOXVILLE, TENN., Nov. 16—Green Patterson and James Henry Young were riding in a lonely hollow near Wild Goose post-office.
