Railroad News. Chattanooga Times: Col. C. M. McGehee yesterday stated to a Times reporter that the Knoxville and Ohio railroad extension from Careyville, where the line now ends, to meet the extension of the Louisville and Knoxville railroad, which will be made by the L. and N., will be made at an early day. The stockholders will meet on December 8th, when in all probability an order will be made authorizing advertisement for bids for undertaking the work.

The East Tennessee, Virginia & Georgia railroad company will obtain possession January 1st, 1881, of the Webster foundry buildings, purchased by that company as a freight depot. The buildings will then at once be put in condition and will be ready for occupancy by spring.

Manager F. de Funiak has announced himself open for the reception of propositions for the completion of the first seventeen miles of the extension of the Knoxville branch of the Louisville and Nashville railroad.
