Entertainments by the Literary Societies.

ATHENS, Nov. 30, 1880. MR. EDITOR: The semi-annual exhibitions of the literary societies of East Tennessee Wesleyan university were given, that of the Athenian society on Friday, the 26th inst., and that of the Philomathean society on Monday evening, the 29th. Both exercises were well attended, and passed off pleasantly and successfully. The Athenian programme consisted of a debate between Henry Faud and Samuel G. Ketrin, of Aroadia; the "Athenaeum," of the society paper, edited by J. E. Deacon, of Oakdale, Va.; a thrilling declamation, "The Rum Maniac," by Lisle M. Caldwell, of Cleveland, Ohio, and two orations, one excellent, the first "The Problem of Life," of George W. Winstead, of Dresden, and the second, "I Still Live," by W. H. Robeson, of Athens. The Philomathean entertained consisted of a debate, well-conducted, between V. N. Smith, of McMinnville, and R. D. Whites, of Athens; a recitation of Poe's "Raven," by Ernest B. Caldwell, of Cleveland, Ohio; an essay, "The Confessions of a Boy," by Chas. B. Davis, of Athens; an excellent rendering of "The Death of Little Nell," from Dickens, by John H. McCallie, of Trundle's X Roads; the reading of an unusually well prepared number of the society paper, "The Philomathean," by its editor, Douglas Caulking, of Knoxville, and an oration upon "Death," by J. W. P. Massey, of Barboursville, Ky. The exercises of both exhibitions were agreeably interspersed with excellent music. ARGUS.

House of Refuge. Nashville Banner. Judge John C. Ferris has appointed the following committee to act with other committees in memorializing the legislature for the establishment in this city of a house of refuge: Mrs. A. H. Bedford, Mrs. Sallie Polk Fall, Mrs. Col. Goodlett, Hon. J. M. Lea, and ex-Gov. Neill S. Brown. The institution is to be a state and not a county or corporation affair. It is necessary that the institution should be located in Nashville on account of the numerous manufactories here, which will afford employment to the children who may become inmates of the same. That such an institution is needed here no one doubts. Judge Ferris has labored hard for the past seven years for a house of refuge, and he now has high hopes that his efforts will be rewarded.
