The Tariff Commission.
New York, October 3.—The Tariff Commission to-day had a number of persons, one of whom—Geo. W. Dean, of New York—advocated an increase in the tariff law, authorizing the Secretary of the Treasury to increase the import duties one-sixth whenever the imports of any one year exceed five-sixths of the value of the exports for the same year. The step to be taken without waiting for Congressional action.

Mr. Joseph Lyman, representing the firm of A. Law & Brothers, importers of raw silk, hemp, jute, sugar and Guano sundries, read an argument against the proposed increase of duty on jute. He assumed it to be the common sense of the people that the tariff should be simplified and relieved of all unnecessary taxation, and that the Tariff Commission must desire to have arguments in regard to the special articles treated. He therefore, asked to present the facts in regard to manilla, sisal, hemp, jute and jute twine. Jute paid 10 cents a ton and jute twine 50 cents a ton. The annual import of jute was about 60,000 bales, and of jute twine 300,000 bales. The product to revenue of Virginia was somewhat less than \$500,000. He believed that there were no vested interests that could properly demand a tax on these two sorts of raw fibres. The cry came, however, from the Louisiana newspapers that jute could be raised there as a valuable crop. He had heard that cry for about ten years, but he had not yet seen a bale of jute or of jute cuttings of American production, and he had heard or read of only ten bales raised in Louisiana.

Mr. H. H. Wolfe, of New York, representing twenty-five wire and spring manufacturers, a large majority, he said, of all such manufacturers in the country, made an argument against an increase of duty on steel wire rods, which is at present 30 per cent, and in favor of its reduction. Dr. H. H. Wolfe, of New York, importer, made a long argument in favor of the abolition of the duty on raw materials, such as coal and iron ore, and a reduction of duty on other forms of iron. He said that the duty on bituminous coal as a means of reducing the cost of manufacture in the Eastern States. He also favored a direct tax, and a tax on excise and duties. He suggested a system of legislation by which \$100,000,000 would be derived from the tariff, \$100,000,000 from direct taxation, \$100,000,000 from excise duties, and \$60,000,000 from miscellaneous sources.

Another Strike.
DARTON, October 3.—Some 250 cartmen and general laborers in the coal-mines and iron furnaces at Wellston, Jackson County, struck this morning, closing the mines entirely. The cause of the strike is the refusal of the operators to pay the same wages as at Coaling, 20 cents more per day. The matter will be referred to a committee of five operators and five miners. It is thought that the operators will not accede to the demand. This cuts off 25 per cent of the coal supply from the city, and the yield of about 60 cars. The Emma blasting furnace was the last to close, but did so this evening. The men are quiet and no violence is anticipated.

Suicide.
NORFOLK, Va., Oct. 4.—Mrs. Wm. M. Haman, wife of a well known business man of Norfolk, left Baltimore last evening as passenger on a Bay Line steamer, when of Point Lookout, a lady, her companion, in a state room, was aroused by a cold draught of air from a raised window, and discovered that Mrs. Haman was missing. A search was made, but she could not be found. She had been dependent for some weeks and had gone north for recreation. Her condition of mind was thought to be the cause of the suicide. She leaves several young children.

Railroad Matters.
LEWISVILLE, October 4.—The Louisville and Nashville Railroad directors, who are in the city to attend the annual meeting to-day, were received on "change yesterday with marked courtesy. The directors were made by gentlemen representing the leading branches of business, and the utmost confidence was expressed in the future of the road. Assurances were given of the hearty co-operation of the citizens in every effort to advance its interests and extend its influence.

Boat Race.
MANCHESTER, N. H., October 4.—The four-oared working boat race was won by the West End crew, of Boston; Forest Rowers, of Salem, second; St. Mary's, of Charleston, third; Fenwick's, of Manchester, fourth, being last. Unofficial time, sixteen minutes and thirty-five seconds. Courtesy time made in special race, sixteen minutes and one-half seconds.

Yellow Fever.
GALVESTON, Texas, October 4.—A dispatch to the News from Brownsville, says three or four cases have been reported officially in Brownsville, Matamoros and Point Isabel. There are no deaths reported from Matamoros. The epidemic there may be considered at an end.

DANVILLE, Va., October 3.—The Tobacco Association at its annual session to-day, elected T. N. Brown president. Reports from various sections of Virginia, North Carolina, represent the quality and color fully equal to the crop of 1880, if not superior. Island Home Baptist Church.
Dedication of this handsome House of Worship, by Dr. Strickland.

The dedication last Sunday of that beautiful church edifice, the Island Home Baptist Church, a notice of which was crowded out of our last issue, was an event of extraordinary moment and importance in that thriving and growing community. The Almighty Ruler of the universe, from his throne above, smiled upon the day as well as the deed, and, although it was rather too warm for comfort in the open sunshine, it was a delightfully beautiful and clear day, and all nature was caught up with the prevailing joy.

The seating capacity of the church was augmented by the addition of chairs along each aisle, and into the room were assembled all that could be possibly accommodated, perhaps between 400 and 500 persons. Most of these were ladies, the gentlemen mainly giving way to them. Seats were arranged at the side door, outside, for the accommodation of some of those unable to gain admittance, and others were gathered throughout the grove, so that there were perhaps more people outside than in.

The excellent choir of the First Baptist Church, with the addition of some others of Knoxville's talented vocalists, opened the exercises with music, with Mr. Thos. Richards presiding with much grace and proficiency at the elegant new pipe organ with which the church is provided.

The pastor of the church, Rev. G. W. Strickland, presided at the occasion. Dr. Strickland took for his text Genesis, 28th chapter, 17th and 18th verses. With this as a basis the reverend gentleman delivered a sermon of great power and effect, highly and admirably appropriate to the occasion, couched in language of the very best selection, and delivered with a true, genuine and soul-stirring eloquence which held his audience in such a grasp and unintermitted attention that the full hour consumed in the delivery seemed scarcely half that time. Dr. Strickland is one of our ablest and most eloquent divines, and he did himself all honor on this occasion. The subject of his sermon, and the main thought was founded upon the act of the dedication to God of the first place of worship known to sacred history, as recorded in the text and context.

At the close of the sermon, after music and an eloquent prayer by Rev. P. B. McCarrill, two of the former beloved pastors of the church, Rev. C. L. Bowling and Rev. P. B. McCarrill, were called upon and added some appropriate remarks, and a final collection was taken up to meet a small balance remaining against the new church. Dr. Strickland and the pastor, Rev. G. W. Brower, added some remarks of thanks to the friends who rendered valuable assistance. Dr. Strickland offered up a solemn dedicatory prayer, the choir sang the doxology, and the audience was dismissed with the benediction.
