

To the Voters of Knox County. We, the undersigned committee, appointed to solicit subscriptions to capital stock of the Knoxville Bridge Company...

Your County Court, after a proper consideration of the matter, unanimously voted to take stock to the amount of \$50,000. Their action is, however, subject to the will of the people...

The \$50,000 will be paid in ten year bonds, in five payments of \$10,000 each—three months between each payment; so that by the time the last payment will have been made, the bridge will have been completed...

After the bridge has been completed, the income from it, applied to the payment of these bonds, will, at the end of ten years, have paid the \$50,000, and leave a surplus besides.

The facts upon which we base this assumption are these: The Government Bridge, which cost the county one hundred dollars, and was kept in operation about ten months, yielded a net income to the county, after paying the purchase money, twelve hundred dollars for a draw, and other expenses, two thousand dollars.

It will, however, be remembered that the County Court thought proper to reduce the tariff of tolls from time to time, so that the rates charged for crossings were nearly nominal, and the bridge thereby made nearly a free one.

This is not all. Following this will be the construction of good roads into the State of North Carolina, through the counties of Sevier and Blount, which will bring thousands of persons to Knoxville to find a market for their surplus...

It is not necessary in this brief address to tell you of the superiority, in safety and expedition, afforded persons in crossing the bridge as compared with the ferries...

The County Court has designated the 1st day of November next as the day on which you may cast your votes for the enterprise, and we may rest the hope that all will vote for "subscription," as it is manifestly to their interests, to do so.
