Last Honors to Fillmore and Sumner.

BUFFALO, March 12.—Shortly after 2 o'clock the doors of the Cathedral were opened to admit the United States Senatorial and House Committees, Legislative Committees, members of Governor Dix's military staff, the Mayor and city authorities, and committees of the Council of the University of Buffalo, the Bar of the Erie County Board of Trade, and representatives of other civic societies.

The casket was then borne to the hearse, and the procession moved in the following order: Major General Howard and Brigadier General Rogers and staff, Company D of the Buffalo City Guard, Sixty-fifth and Seventy-fourth Regiments of the National Guard, companies A and C of the first United States Infantry, under Colonel De Russy as guard of honor.

Gladstone Retires from the Liberal Leadership.

LONDON, March 11.—The Daily News and Telegram give the following correct account of the treaty of peace with the Ashantees: The King agrees to pay to Great Britain a war indemnity of fifty thousand ounces of gold, and renounces all claim to Adansi, Assin, Denkera, Akim and Wassaw.
