

LOCAL AND NEWS ITEMS.

Judge LITTLEJOHN has arrived in town and the Circuit Court commenced its session yesterday.

The river now being clear of ice the steamer *L. G. Mason* will start on her regular trips to Grand Rapids the coming week.

Our readers will please excuse our short-comings this week. Our editor is sick and the duty of issuing the paper devolves upon your humble servant—

In our notice last week of the tug recently built by Capt. Squires, the name should have read "*Miranda*." She will be ready to commence towing in about ten days.

LARGE flocks of pigeons are daily passing over our village on their way north, and the almost constant sound of muskets show that our hunters are fully prepared for the sport.

A MECHANIC of Milwaukee has manufactured an ordinary size center table, octagonal in form, composed of twenty thousand pieces of wood. It is designed as a present to President Lincoln and lady.

THE value of the yearly catch of fish in Michigan is estimated in value at over \$1,000,000, a greater amount than that of all the other fresh water fisheries of the remaining States in the Union.—Grand Haven contributes very largely to its value.

Among the list of Michigan men who have died in the rebel "slaughter pens" at Danville, Va., we notice the name of John Vandenberg, of this place. John was brave and true, and was always found in his place shoulder to shoulder with his comrades when the hour of danger and death came.

NAVIGATION.—The first departure of the season from this port was the schooner *Alwick*, bound to Chicago loaded with lumber. She had a very stormy passage.

Last Saturday evening the steamship *Milwaukee* left this place on her first trip to Milwaukee. She returned yesterday morning. The *Detroit* is expected to leave in a few days. Both boats have been thoroughly overhauled and refitted in splendid style.

THE sugar-making season is fairly inaugurated. Makers were gladdened with fine runs on Friday, Saturday and Sunday last, for the first. We look for a supply in market at an early day. Never has the business opened on so extensive a scale, in our county, as during the present season. Every farmer who has a "bush" seems bent on making, at least a supply for home consumption.

THE school examination and exhibition at Lamont, on Friday afternoon and evening of last week, demonstrated that the pupils of the Union School, of that village, under the instruction of Mr. Wallen and assistants, have made excellent improvement in the various branches taught during the term now closed. Mr. W. gives good satisfaction as principal, and has been further engaged to take charge of the school for the summer term—commencing about the first of April.

WITHIN the recollection of "the oldest inhabitant," the water in Grand river and the creeks tributary to it, has scarcely ever been higher than on Friday and Saturday last. The Grand River and State roads over the Crockery Flats were quite impassable and other points in the River Road deeply flooded. The ice in the river commenced moving above us on Saturday with a rushing, crashing and grating rarely known, taking along with it the large and numerous rafts of timber, lumber and shingles that have wintered, in mid-stream, between this place and Grand Rapids, to the very great loss to owners.
