BY TELEGRAPH. Arrival of the Steamship Niagara. New York, Dec. 11. The Niagara arrived last night. She left Liverpool on the 29th ult., and brings 34 passengers. On Tuesday last, about 11 A. M., she passed a large steamer striking east. The Franklin arrived out on the 29th.

INVESTMENT MARKETS.—There has been a fair demand for home consumption, and export, western canal is at 18 1/2-19; Southern 17 1/2-18; Ohio 17 1/2-18; American 17 1/2-18; India 17 1/2-18; and full prices are paid. Indian corn 49 1/2, and little inquiry; white 21 1/2-30, mixed 25 1/2-64, yellow 26 1/2-64. Provisions are much the same as at the sailing of the Pacific. Beef rather lower.

PORK.—More business doing and lower rates accepted. American stock out at first hands quoted at 30-43 1/2. Vams and shoulders are neglected. Lard depressed by recent extensive importations, and prices are lower. Cheese in steady demand at from 37-40. Money continues abundant. A reduction of interest by the Bank of England from 5 to 4 1/2 per cent. of bullion therein. English funds firm. Paris investing in Australia, with the exception of the Consols 3 1/2, steady feeling. No particular change in American stocks. Manchester trade active.

FRANCE.—The engrossing topic throughout Europe is the approaching crisis of the affairs in France. The Assembly, despite the recent successes and remarkable popularity of President Louis Napoleon, have resolved to provoke him into direct collision with them. On Tuesday, November 25th, the President delivered in the Chamber Discourses and medals to the various exhibitors at the London Exhibition, and addressed a speech on the occasion, which was likely to make him popular with the Republican party. It was the first he had uttered in which any motion was made of the Republic. The consequence was that many who were devoted to the views of Gen. Cavaignac had declared that they would support the President, being the only means of saving the Republic. An extraordinary argument of incredible length had appeared in the Constitution when a direct attack was made on some of the highest names in France. Such as Gen. Changarnier, Mons. M. Berlier and others who were charged with being members of the Secret Govt., and to overthrow the Government. Never had a newspaper article produced so much excitement as it was directed against the Orléanists, and the legitimists, and the paper is believed to be in the interest of the Government, and the Ministry to be aware of its production, or to have assisted in it. It was generally believed that the bill regulating the responsibility of the President French funds had raised in 91 francs, 65 cents and the Bourse seemed quite buoyant.

Washington, Dec. 10. SENATE.—Messrs. Walker, Dodge and Gyar gave notice of bills to grant lands in aid of Railroads in Wisconsin and Missouri. Mr. Underwood offered a resolution directing inquiries into a proper method of making the navigation of the Ohio river permanent. Mr. U. from the committee on Public Lands reported back joint resolutions making land warrants assignable. The Senate took up the Kossuth resolutions and Mr. Sumner spoke in favor of it. HOUSE.—Mr. Cobb introduced his bill making land warrants transferable. After a one day delay for want of a quorum, the bill was passed without a division.

New York, Dec. 10. Kossuth was to-day addressed by a delegation from Baltimore, consisting of members of the Common Council and citizens. His reply was the most eloquent he has made since his arrival. Some parts affecting the audience to tears. He alluded to the struggles of his country to seek assistance in another attempt for her freedom.

New York, Dec. 6. The correspondent of the London Daily Times writing from Rome, says that the United States is about to be placed on an equal footing with Great Britain, in having a Cardinal in New York. Archbishop Hughes was about to be created a member of the sacred college. An important seizure had been made in Paris, by the agent of Police, of a quantity of arms and ammunition and important papers, relating to the plot by the Socialists for a democratic socialist republic. Ten persons were arrested.

The brig Suzan arrived to-day from Rio Janeiro, with dates to the 24th of October. The latest arrivals from Monte Video say that Creber was expected there and would soon restore peace in the Banda Oriental.

The Rio market for breadstuffs was overstocked with arrivals from the United States and Great Britain. The stock in first hands amounted to 2,000 bbls. in Brista and Pernambuco. The stock was large.

The Courier and Enquirer, of this morning says by special telegram from our Washington correspondent, we learn the steamer Atlantic was to sail to-day was then briefly detained by an arrangement with the State Department to take the mail from Washington which was despatched yesterday afternoon. Mr. Webster has written a despatch to Mr. Lawrence, our Minister at the Court of St. James, to ascertain immediately from Lord Palmston, whether the late outrage to the Prometheus was authorized by standing or special orders from his government. The communication states that the outrage is considered as a direct violation of the first article of the first article of the Treaty of April, 1850. Immediate action in relation to the matter is insisted upon either by the return of Mr. B. to us, or by the appointment of some of his own persons of sufficient authority. The tone of this official paper is high just and American. Letters have also been written urging Mr. Lawrence to proceed firmly and promptly.

New York, Dec. 9. Kossuth's MOVEMENTS TO-DAY.—A delegation of the American and Foreign Anti-Slavery Society called upon Kossuth this morning. Lewis Tappan, chairman, read a long address and a letter welcoming him to these shores. Kossuth thanked him for the address and letter, and said he was sure they would not endeavor to enter him in questions of a party character. He must attend to one or two courses, and not be forced to concern himself with any principle, but the great principle of his country's liberation. He was, also, waited upon by the Rev. John Kennedy J. M. Thayer and S. P. Fitch, deputation from 45 Clergymen of the Methodist Episcopal Church of Williamsburgh, for the purpose of obtaining information what would be convenient to him to receive a welcome and a symposium address in a body. He was also, waited upon by Mr. Booth Lawrence, Lieut. Gov. of Rhode Island, to invite him to visit that State and participate in the hospitality of the Capital. Kossuth thanked him and was pleased that a Governor of this U. S. should come forward to identify himself with the cause of Hungary. The President's son, Mr. W. P. Fillmore, waited upon him at the Irving House, and said that his father, the President, would be pleased to see and welcome him at the seat of government, and he desired to know when it was his intention to be in Washington. Kossuth replied that his movements were somewhat uncertain, and that it was somewhat doubtful whether he should go to Washington at all. The action of the Senate was far from being agreeable, and anxious ones would go on a future session with regard to placing Washington and other places.
