The Midnight Dispatches.

New York, April 10. - Cotton, heavy and declined 2c; flour, heavy; whiskey, \$2 27; wheat, \$1 65; oats, 41c; coffee, quiet - Java, 27c; sugar, steady at 9c to 14c; molasses quiet, 44c to 75c; pork, \$25 62 1/2; gold, 25 1/2; sterling, 64c; Government securities, steady. The United States' bonded warehouse in Greenwold street, is reported to have been robbed, on Saturday night, of silks to the amount of \$10,000, the property of A. T. Stewart & Co. One of the clerks of the Bank of America was robbed at the entrance of the sub-treasury of \$2000 in gold certificates last night. Three unknown ruffians attempted to rob the book-keeper of Roach & Co. of \$12,000. The Manhattan Club proposes to give a dinner to James Brooks. Stockton, Voorhies and Proctor will be present. The steamship Penna has arrived from Jamaica. The Commissioners were about closing the investigation of the rebellion, and would soon leave for England. The foreign apprehensions of trouble in Germany, and the Fenian agitation, continue to depress funds. Consols are 68, and have touched a lower point than since the crisis of 1857. There is but little alteration of American securities. Five-twentieths and Erie stocks closed with an advance of 1/4. Paris Bourse flat at 68. Nothing has transpired to throw any light upon the mutual issue of the quarrel between Austria and Prussia. The Independent Belge publishes intelligence from Weimar, stating that the King of Prussia gave his consent to military arrangements which indicate that war is inevitable. Collenso has intimated his intention to maintain his right as Colonial Bishop. FROM LONDON. - The rate of discount remains at six per cent. Sugar, quiet and steady; coffee, firm; tea, firmer; rice, steady; consols, 66 1/2. The London Post says the situation of affairs is every day becoming more critical. The British press, by evident dictation of the Government, is warlike, and great military preparations are being made throughout the Kingdom of Austria. The Government has also taken measures anticipating the ensuing trouble. Her armaments are very extensive. NEW ORLEANS, April 10. - Cotton is depressed; sales, 1400 bales; receipts, 1030 bales; receipts for past four days, 3000 bales; aggregate, 12,000 for a corresponding period last week; exports, 10,500 bales; stock, 173,000 bales; sugar is in better demand at 14 1/2; molasses, nominal; flour, \$7 60; corn, active at 8 1/2 @ 85c; oats, 50c 5/8; cress, pork, \$28; bacon - clearsides 15 1/2; shoulders 13 1/2; tobacco, fair at 14 1/2; sterling has de-

clined to 30 1/2; New York checks 35c discount; gold, 24 1/2; freight to New York 1c, to Liverpool 9-16 @, to Havre 1/2 @. The Methodist Conference has discussed the Episcopal veto, and the Baltimore Conference is commissioned to extend its business to New Orleans. The Federal policies were required. WASHINGTON, April 10. - The President has proclaimed a treaty with the Winnebago Indians and the United States, and also signed the deficiency appropriation bill. In the House a resolution was adopted directing the Secretary of War to furnish the House with the findings of the Commission in the case of award for the capture of Booth and Harold. In the House the Bankrupt bill was rejected by a vote of 73 against 70. CINCINNATI, April 10. - Flour, quiet and unchanged; wheat, \$1 85; corn, 51c; oats and whiskey, dull; provisions, drooping; pork, \$25; bulk meats, 9 1/2 @ 15 1/2; bacon, dull; lard, 15c. LOUISVILLE, April 10. - Tobacco, unchanged - sales to-day, 126 hhds; cotton - low middling, 30c; flour, \$6 75; pork, \$25; bacon shoulders, 12c; whiskey, \$2 22. TORONTO, April 10. - Michael Murphy, President of the Hibernian Society, and five others were arrested to-day, while on their way to Portland, as it was supposed, on business connected with the Fenian movement. St. Louis, April 10. - Cotton dull and declined 1c; flour, wheat and corn unchanged; oats 4 1/2c; provisions and whiskey unchanged. FROM LIVERPOOL. - The commercial news is no later than that received by the England, but more in detail. Flour, very dull; wheat, downward; corn had advanced 6d; pork, easier; bacon, inactive; sugar declined 6d; coffee, inactive.
