BOARD OF HEALTH.-At the meeting of the Board of Health yesterday, the following rules and regulations for the guidance of the Metropolitan Sanitary Police were adopted :

They will patrol their districts continually, and inspect all private premises at least once a week, and see that the yards, back-houses, privies and cellars are cleaned, whitewashed and thoroughly disinfected. They will visit every day those houses which are sub-let and inhabited by a large number of families. white or black, and see that the premises are thoroughly cleaned and whitewashed at least once a week. They will visit such buildings day and night, and when they find a case of cholera or small-pox, pronounced such by the ward physician, they will remove him at once to the pest house. Whenever they find a case of cholera or small-pox in such houses, they

must at once prevent the access of any

one to their presence, except those in

attendance; they must see that all per-

sons, black or white, who die of cholera

or small-pox, must be buried in six hours,

small-pox coming within their knowledge to the Sanitary office, and will send all such cases as they find nearly destitute, without attendance, to the pest-house, and all such cases as take place in crowded boarding houses, and in tene ments sub-let to numbers of families. Citizens are requested to report all nuisances, public or private, that may come under their observation to the Sanitary office, No. 17 Madison street. The committee appointed to wait upon the Judge of the County Court, after consultation among themselves referred the matter back to the Board, suggesting the propriety of dropping the matter. In addition to the visiting physicians appointed, a member of the Board for each ward has been appointed, who will constitute a committee of inspecting physicians. A resolution was passed ordering the publication of the names and residences of physicians appointed to attend upon the indigent poor.

During he past twenty-four hours it had fallen 2 inches at the head of the falls, and 6 at Portland. The weather was cloudy yesterday and very warm, with a light dash of rain in the morning, and the promise of a storm in the evening. On the falls last evening there were three feet ten inches water in the pass down the Indian chute, and falling.

The Fort Smith, Capt. Ed. Nowland's lew steamer, work about fifteen miles below Van Buren, at 2 o'clock on the morning of the 8th inst. She struck a mag and went down almost instantly. Her cabin and upper works parted from the hull, and it is feared the boat is a total loss. She was on her second trip. and was loaded with government stores for Fort Gibson, besides about three The boat was new, and cost about \$30, 000. Capt. Nowland was at the wheel when she struck. We learn that she was insured at Cincinnati for \$10,000. No lives were lost.

A Gallipolis dispatch of the 15th states that about 11:10 a.m., the steamer Allena May blew up at the head of Raccoon Island. Virginia. She had just made the landing and was backing out, when both boilers blew up. She is a complete wreck. Two men belonging to the crew were killed. Capt. Hamilton was badly wounded. The mate was badly wounded also the clerk and several passengers Several passengers are missing. One died going up on the Nora. The accident occurred six miles below Gallipolis Among those scalded is S. W. Flowers engineer, well-known in river circles, who was a passenger on the boat at the
