Grant's Letter of Acceptance.
The letter of Gen. Grant, accepting the nomination of the Chicago negro supremacy despotism, is being forth far more and severe strictures of the press than his nomination has produced of enthusiasm in any part of the country. The hurrah is not on his side, and it is impossible to create it there. His declaration that "in times like the present it is impossible, or at least eminently improper, to lay down a policy to be adhered to, right or wrong," and that "a purely administrative officer should always be left free to execute the will of the people," instead of producing the impression which he evidently intended, is resulting in stronger suspicions that he has designs on the public liberty. The first and second Napoleon, Cromwell and Caesar all professed profound respect for and professed to be executing the will of the people when they were paving the way to empire, as Grant as an imitator is now doing. We append the following, from the Baltimore People's Weekly:

We conversed not long since with one of General Grant's old messmates, and enthusiastic admirers. If his estimate of Grant's abilities and purposes are correct, we have been greatly mistaken. To our suggestion that Grant owed his position partly to the political influence of Washburn and other personal friends of Illinois, and partly to jealousy of McClellan on the part of the politicians at Washington, and that he had succeeded against Lee, not by military sagacity, but by the mere sacrifice of numbers and the exhaustion of the Confederacy; he replied that he knew Grant well; that he has all the genius and ten times the ambition of Julius Caesar; that it was neither political influence, nor jealousy of McClellan, but his own head and sagacity, which had raised him to the first place in the army, from which he had been forced to resign under charges; that Grant of all men knew how and when to wait for, or seize, opportunities, and turn them to his own advantage; that the Radical leaders thought they were using Grant, but that Grant was using them; that he was too circumpet himself to disclose his true motives; but that, knowing him as he did, he understood what was meant by Dent and Rawlings, when they said that Grant would give up his position at the head of the army, which was for life, for the sake of being President only four years; that Grant was quietly encouraging Congress in attacks upon the Executive and the Judiciary, because all history proved that in the progress of legislative usurpations the time always and soon came, when he who could count on the army could seat himself in the Executive chair for life, with any title he might think proper to assume.

To our question whether he believed Grant entertained any such ambitious views, he replied that he was confident that he did; that from many conversations with him at West Point, and since, he knew that Grant had the ambition of the Caesar; that he had heard of the ambition of Cromwell, and Napoleon, and he knew that he would be a despot, but his ambition would be to build up, instead of destroying the country; and that it would be better for the country at large, and especially the South, to prosper under his empire than to be ruined by this Radical Congress and their thieving emissaries.

At the time we attached but little importance to these ideas, which, we thought, might have been born of the wish for a marshal's baton under the prospective empire; but subsequent events—the late rapid and determined progress of the destructives in Congress, since their temporary check on the report of the impeachment committee—and the following striking passages in our late readings, lead us to think that perhaps there was more in it than was dreamed of in our philosophy.

Calhoun, in his speech on the National Bank, September 26th, 1837, speaking of the States Rights party, said:

"We are the sworn enemies both of executive and legislative usurpations; and of the two, more opposed, if possible, to the latter than the former, because in the nature of things, they must take precedence in the order of time. Without precedence in the order of time, no executive legislation in Congress must first encroach on the powers of the States before the Executive can become strong enough to encroach on its powers; but as soon as they do, the benefit inures not to them, but to the President. Reason and experience both prove this."

These views were not altogether original with Mr. Calhoun; for in his speech

commanding the department of the Tennessee, did publish the following order:

"HEADQUARTERS 23d ARMY CORPS,
DEPARTMENT OF THE TENNESSEE,
"GENERAL ORDER, No. 11.)
"The Jews, as a class, violating every regulation of trade established by the Treasury Department, also department orders, are hereby expelled from the department within twenty-four hours from the receipt of this order by post commanders.

"They will see that all this class of people are furnished with passes, and required to leave; and any one returning after such notification will be arrested and held in confinement until an opportunity occurs of sending them out as prisoners, unless furnished with permits from these headquarters.

"No passes will be given this people to visit headquarters for the purpose of making personal application for trade permits.

"By order of Major General Grant,
"JOHN A. RAWLING, A. A. G.
"Official: J. LOVELL, Captain and A. A. G.

"And in pursuance thereof did cause many peaceable citizens of the United States, residents in the said department, to be expelled therefrom within twenty-four hours without allegation of special misconduct on their part, and on no other proof than that they were members of a certain religious denomination; and, WHEREAS, the said order, with its sweeping condemnation of a whole class of citizens, without discriminating between the guilty and the innocent, is illegal and unjust, and in its execution is tyrannical and cruel; therefore, Resolved, That the said order deserves the sternest condemnation of the House, and of the President as commander-in-chief."

Which resolution was laid on the table, by a vote of 56 to 53.

We do not profess to be politicians par excellence, and we do not often descend into the arena for a political fight, but in this case we are bound to make an exception, and to show up to our countrymen and to our friends here, and who their friends were at a time when they were assailed by a man who now stands forward as the most prominent candidate of the Republican party, who courts the votes of citizens, whose families he, a second Torquemada, expelled from their homes, whose fathers and husbands, he declared to be outcasts, and whose faces he banished for hundreds of miles round his holy camp. We sincerely hope the Jewish citizens of the United States will bear in mind that the contest between Pendleton and Grant is a contest between light and darkness, between liberty of conscience and between Puritanical fanatics, who, like their forefathers two hundred years ago, would hang and burn everybody whose religious persuasion is different from their own. It is our duty to vote for religionists, and to show up to our countrymen and to our friends here, and because George H. Pendleton has been fighting for the Jews, the Jews will exercise all their influence and their whole power for George H. Pendleton during the approaching Presidential campaign.

His Speech.

Grant made the following speech on being visited by the committee appointed to inform him of his nomination:

"You'd scarce expect one of my age, to speak in public on the stage. And if I chance to fall below Charles Sumner and Galusha Grow, Don't view me with Ben Butler's eyes. But pass my imperfections by. From Marshall's part great dogs do blow: From little ones the great noise flows. And if I agree, it is too late. For me to try to outwit religionists was to show up to our countrymen and to our friends here, and because George H. Pendleton has been fighting for the Jews, the Jews will exercise all their influence and their whole power for George H. Pendleton during the approaching Presidential campaign.
