FLIPPER'S TRIAL.

Testimony as to How He Kept Public Funds. Two Thousand Dollars in a Pair of Saddle-Bags.

GALVESTON, November 8.—In the Flipper case yesterday the defense endeavored to show the treatment of Lieutenant Flipper while in the guard-house cell, and under the close confinement of the guardhouse. Col. Shafter was prompted by a spirit not warranted by the customs of the army. The court objected to this mode of examination, on the ground that it had nothing to do with the offense, if any had been committed, and it was not within the province of the court to mitigate the punishment. The objection was withdrawn.

Finally Colonel Shafter stated that before relieving Flipper from the commissary department he had considered him perfectly honest and of good habits, and that if money was stolen it had been done by others. He further stated that previous to the investigation Flipper's administration had given entire satisfaction. On the 10th of August Flipper was seen in town with a horse and saddle-bags, possibly preparatory to a journey. He was ordered back immediately to turn over his funds on hand. Within two or three minutes after entering his quarters some two thousand dollars were found on his desk ready for delivery, but he could not say whether it was in his saddle-bags when last seen or not. It has since been learned that he generally kept the public money in his quarters instead of the office safe. He had always examined his accounts weekly, unless he was absent.

CRITTENDEN COUNTY, ARK. James Barton Appointed Sheriff Until Special Election.

Special to the Ledger. LITTLE ROCK, November 8.—The Governor appointed James Barton Sheriff of Crittenden county until the special election, ordered December 8th.

QUINCY, ILL. Damages by Rise of the River Estimated \$2,980,000.

St. LOUIS, November 8.—A special from Quincy, Ills., says: The water recedes here very slowly, and it will be several days before the branches of business that have been interrupted can get back into their natural grooves again. All the open country lying between the north end of the Sky Levee and the south of Quincy is to be leveled as soon as the work can be done, and the damaged levees are to be repaired. Many estimates have been made as to the amount of damage done by the flood, but these are the most accurate. The entire losses in the Warsaw drainage district are \$600,000; in Indian Grove district \$750,000; in Soy Island district \$1,900,000; on Quincy Bay and in the city, \$300,000; and about Alexanderville, Missouri, \$250,000; to the Keokuk & St. Louis railroad, \$100,000; to all other railroads \$200,000; to open lands north of Sky levee and just south of this city, \$50,000, making the total \$2,980,000. The full extent of the loss can only be gauged when the river has returned to its banks.

Country Store Burned. SPRING LICK, KY., November 8.—A store house at Giff's Crossing, in this county, and all the goods therein, has been consumed by fire. The house was discovered on fire a few minutes after the passenger train going west had passed, and it is believed that the fire was caused by sparks from the engine. The house belonged to J. W. Bradshaw, and the goods to H. Clay Field. Field's loss is estimated at six hundred dollars, and Bradshaw's at the same.

River Telegrams. EVANSVILLE, November 8.—River rising with 4-10 feet on the gauge. The Gaff is edging liberally here. The Will Kyle struck an obstruction at Slim Island last night and sunk 8 feet at the bow and 12 feet at the stern. No further particulars. It has been raining here since nine o'clock this morning.

A Black Eye for Woman's Suffrage. SAN FRANCISCO, November 8.—In Washington Territory the Legislative Council killed the woman's suffrage bill by a vote of five yeas to seven nays.

Gigantic Strike Pending in England.

Important Tribes Agree to Submit to the French. Havoc by Yellow Fever in Western Africa.

LONDON, November 8.—In Cortes, Madrid, a debate or address in reply to a speech from the throne concluded that the government was decisively victorious.

HANLEY, November 8.—In various towns of Staffordshire the potteries are on the eve of a gigantic strike, all men connected with the Operatives' Association having resolved to cease work. On Thursday, unless the advance is granted, the strike will effect fifty thousand employes. At a meeting yesterday the employers pledged themselves to refuse the advance.

According to advices from Benny, Western Africa, yellow fever has caused terrible havoc in Senegal.

A Berlin dispatch says: In the second ballot for members to the Reichstag Dr. Falk was victorious at Worms by a sweeping majority. Most of the second elections up to the present time have resulted in favor of the Liberals.

A dispatch from Tunis says important tribes in the Teberrouk district have agreed to submit to the French.

BONNY, AFRICA, November 8.—Reports from New Calabar indicate that another war is imminent here between King Akakerre and Will Braid. Several sanguinary contests have already occurred between the followers of both parties. The powerful chiefs Oko, Jumbo and Jaja intend to join in the hostilities, the former siding with Will Braid and the latter with King Akakerre.

LONDON, November 8.—The Marquis of Salisbury, acknowledging the receipt of an expression of confidence from the Conservative Club, expressed with severity the past and present tactics of the government in its treatment of the Irish question and declares its policy dangerous to the property and prosperity of the country.

James Twite, formerly secretary of the Mulligan branch of the Land League, who was discharged from Kilmalsham jail Friday last, was re-arrested to-day, supposed because of violent speeches, which caused much excitement.

MAIDSTONE, November 8.—The trial of Arthur Lefroy for the murder of Gold came to a close to-day. The court room was densely crowded. A remarkable number of women were present. Lord Chief Justice Coleridge's summing up for the prosecution was strongly against the prisoner, and tended to throw discredit on the point on which the defense relied: that Lefroy had not pawned his pistol, and showed entire disbelief in the prisoner's assertion, that a third person was present in the railway car at the time of the murder. The prisoner was found guilty and sentenced to be hanged. After the sentence had been passed Lefroy protested his innocence.

Washington, November 8.—For Tennessee and the Ohio valley, local rains and cooler and partly cloudy weather. Variable winds, mostly from south to west and in eastern portion falling barometer.

PITTSBURG Election and Weather. PITTSBURG, November 8.—The election is passing off quietly and a very light vote is being polled. The weather is bright and warm.

A Fire and a Suicide. CINCINNATI, November 8.—A fire in the roundhouse of the Louisville, Cincinnati & Lexington railroad, in Covington this morning, inflicted probably \$10,000 damages.

At Marietta this morning, says a Times-Star special, Wm. Newkim, known as Ah Kim, a Chinese missionary student, in the second year of the Preparatory Department at the Marietta College, committed suicide by taking chloral or chloroform last night, and was found dead in his bed this morning. His trouble was disappointment in a love affair with a servant girl in this city.
