About a Failure.
 The recent failure of G. Baum &
 Co., wholesale liquor dealers, is excit-
 ing considerable comment in business
 and other circles. An inventory of
 the concern's assets disclosed but
 \$8000 worth of property, while the
 liabilities are nearly \$50,000. It is
 said that Mr. Baum offers to pay his
 creditors twenty cents on the dollar of
 his indebtedness, and that the books
 of the concern have been hidden or
 made away with. The old gentleman,
 Mr. Baum, always ranked high here
 among those who knew him, but it has
 been generally understood that for the
 past two years he has been financially
 embarrassed. The indebtedness here
 is only \$1500. Due to the Manhattan
 Bank, and secured to that institution
 The principal creditors are Freiberg
 and Workup, of Cincinnati, who, it is
 understood, were Mr. Baum's financial
 backers, and that firm's claims amount
 to \$46,000 or upwards. The remainder
 of the debts are due to firms of various
 cities North, extending west to San
 Francisco, California, and east to the
 Atlantic coast. The assignee, Mr. A.
 Seessel, is the father-in-law of Mr.
 Baum.

Mississippi and Tennessee
RAILWAY.
 Its Annual Meeting Saturday.
 The annual meeting of the stock-
 holders of the Mississippi and Ten-
 nessee Railway Company was held at
 Sardis, Miss., last Saturday, and re-
 sulted in the election of the following
 directors: H. S. McComb, E. C.
 Walthall, R. P. Lake, Thomas W.
 White, Monroe Pointer, A. M. West,
 R. P. Neely, F. M. White and J. W.
 Caldwell. The directors afterward
 elected H. S. McComb, Presi-
 dent; F. M. White, Vice Presi-
 dent; M. Burke, Superintendent;
 A. J. Knapp, General Freight Agent;
 S. H. Lamb, Secretary. The num-
 ber of shares represented was 13,297,
 of \$50 each. The total stock
 aggregates \$664,850, divided in
 shares of \$50 each. It is now quoted
 at 68 to 72 on the market, against
 about 22 a year or so back.
 The total earnings of the road dur-
 ing the last fiscal year ending Sept.
 30th summed up \$492,193 73. The
 operating expenses were \$37,840 30,
 leaving net receipts of \$154,353 43.
 Of the latter the interest on the
 bonded debt consumed \$151,749; sal-
 aries, \$3,975; attorneys' fees, \$1,410 02.
 Other incidentals reduced the amount
 to \$21,234 04, all of which has been
 applied to machinery, cars and chang-
 ing the road gauge to 5 feet 8 1/2 inches.
 The latter item with other unusual
 expenses amounted to \$67,067 72. In
 the list of operating expenses are
 included the following items: For main-
 taining way, \$129,468 54; motive power,
 \$68,200 84; maintaining cars, \$35-
 353 32; and transportation, \$65,117 63.
 A contract has been closed for 1000
 tons of new steel rails.
 The operating expenses increased
 during the year \$41,730 44, while the
 gross receipts fell off \$32,302 75, re-
 ducing the net earnings \$75,033 17.
 The freight earnings fell off \$27,725 30,
 principally from cotton freights. The
 passenger receipts increased \$3,721 07,
 though the local receipts were \$9,856-
 70 less than the previous year.
 The road carried last year 70,222
 bales of cotton grown along the route,
 against 76,211 bales the year before,
 and the number transported by the
 line from this city to New Orleans
 was 107,333 bales. Mr. Wm. M. Par-
 rington, of this city, presided at the
 stockholders' meeting.
 The receipts of cotton here by the
 Mississippi & Tennessee railway from
 September 1st to Friday last were
 16,012 bales, an increase compared
 with last year of 922 bales. The
 quantity carried south from here during
 the same time was this year 12,717
 bales, a decrease of 26,643 bales, as
 compared with last year at the same
 time.
