LONDON, July 31.—The Times says: "We have ample reason for believing that the expedition of the Porte, now determined to send to Egypt, has no other object than to thwart and oppose the efforts of England, now making to restore order there."

Arabi Pasha is still parleying with the Khedive. The latter has intimated that no terms will be acceptable except an unconditional surrender.
