THE DROP OF DEATH.
Edward Hovey Hanged in New York for the Murder of His Sister-in-Law.
The Murderer So Overcome That He Has to Be Carried to the Gallows.
New York, October 19.—Edward Hovey, the slayer of his sister-in-law, Mrs. Mary Kennedy, was hanged this morning at the State Prison. Notwithstanding the physician's treatment and the efforts of his spiritual adviser, the murderer spent a restless night. Two Deputy Sheriffs kept constant vigil. Hovey looked more dead than alive when he went to dress himself. When his breakfast was brought to him he dragged his chair toward the table where the meal was placed, and seated himself in the chair with a heavy sigh. He hesitated, drew back from the table and said he would eat nothing. Father Drummig, Rev. Mr. Gilbert and the deputy warden finally prevailed upon Hovey to sip the coffee. Soon after arising he had been given a dose of chloral, and he now wanted whisky. It was agreed that he should have some stimulant before being led out to the gallows. Hovey had to be supported from the cell to the gallows. He presented an awful picture of despair and woe. The moment he was placed under his legs were tied, the black cap drawn down, the noose adjusted, and quicker than it takes to tell the rope was cut and Hovey hanged.

Foreign Budget.
CAPE TOWN, October 19.—The miners on a strike at Kimberly have become riotous and are doing much damage to property. Special constables fired upon the striking men.
ALEXANDRIA, October 19.—The village in which the cholera has broken out escaped the epidemic. The reappearance of the disease is attributed to infiltration into the canal running through the village of water from the canals in which cholera victims were interred.
ATHENS, October 19.—The government has sent two ships to the Grecian archipelago with supplies for the sufferers by the earthquake. One hundred and twenty bodies have been recovered near Chios, in Anafalis. The search near Anafalis literally swallowed up houses and people.

Wind and Weather.
Northwesterly winds approach us here but they do not bring the temperature down to the front point.
Fair weather in the West Gulf States, also in the Ohio valley and Tennessee, with slightly cooler weather, but no frost in the meteorological predictions here for the next 24 hours.
The lowest temperature this morning was 60° and the range yesterday from 60° to 71°. The wind came from the southwest and southeast all day and was from the same quarter all last night and this morning.
The rain fall at Little Rock last night was 1.1 inches. A similar shower, but heavy rain, prevailed at Cairo this morning and at Grenada and beyond, while at New Orleans and on to Nashville, as well as up the Tennessee valley, the fall ranged from half an inch to one inch. The average for the surrounding country was a little over eighty one-hundredths of an inch.
It was cool enough to be frosty up north North Plains, Neb., this morning, and the general temperature is having an effect on the sugar crop, while it helps late cotton to a considerable degree. The cyclone is a lot of dangerous weather, but it is not altogether dry as various localities have already been favored with refreshing rains. This warm wave is mainly moving south of the 40th parallel, which is a straight line through Nashville, Tenn., and near Omaha on toward the Pacific.

Masonic Digest of Tennessee.
Albert B. Taylor, publisher, Nashville, Tenn., has issued a Masonic Digest, embracing the Constitution, Edicts and Rules of Order of the Grand Lodge, and a brief synopsis of the decisions of the Grand Lodge and Reports of the Committee on Masonic Jurisprudence, with the action of the Grand Lodge thereon. The work was prepared by the Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge, and is published in two copies, but members wishing copies can obtain them for fifty cents each, of the publisher.

The shareholders of the World Publishing Company, at their annual meeting, held at the corner of the Grand Hotel, Irving Hall and County Democrat, which has just been brought about, insure a Democratic majority in New York county of from 60,000 to 80,000.
