WASHINGTON.

American Vessels at the Mercy of Spain. Have we a Navy? New York, June 25.—A Washington dispatch states that Spanish vessels have been instructed to capture and sink all American steamers, the Virginia and Edgar Stewart whenever found outside of neutral ports.

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DUBLIN.

Attempt to Destroy the Statues of Prince Albert and Earl of Carlisle. English dates, just received, present the following dispatch, containing news of which the cable has been silent: "DUBLIN, June 11.—At about 10:45 o'clock last night a report resembling that of a gunshot shot was heard in the vicinity of the Albert and Carlisle statues, which were the object of a tremendous explosion, which shook the entire square, and resembling a very loud clap of thunder, was felt by the inhabitants in the neighborhood of the statues. Some gentlemen ran from their houses, supposing that it might have been an attempt to injure the statue of the Prince Consort. They found the gate leading to the Albert and Carlisle statues open, and on getting a light and proceeding to the monument they found the remains of some powder-cansisters and fragments of plaster model scattered about. The explosion occurred about half an hour after the explosion of some of the police proposed admission to the lawn, but in forty minutes after the event none of the statues were injured, although supposed to be stationed in Merrion square. The monument has been slightly injured. At the same time, and evidently by accident, a great deal of damage was done to the statue of the Earl of Carlisle, in the People's Gardens of Phoenix Park. A good deal of powder was used, and the report was a great one. This last night the explosion was repeated, but the statues being long, as it is supposed. The legs of the statue are injured. The perpetrators have not been arrested."
