

The National Democratic Convention. Cincinnati Platform Adopted Verbatim. Greeley Nominated on First Ballot As the Democratic Candidate. Brown Selected on First Ballot Both Nominations Made Unanimous Speeches, Incidents, Enthusiasm. General Rejoicing over the Land Ratification Salutes in All Leading Cities. Speech of Frank Blair at St. Louis Editorials from Various Journals The Bolters and Female Suffragists

Special to the Union and American. BALTIMORE, July 10.—The report of the Committee on Resolutions, recommending the adoption of the Cincinnati Platform, was received with great applause, but it produced considerable discussion and excitement. The previous question was demanded and sustained, and under its operation, the platform was adopted, yeas 670, nays 62. Tennessee voted aye, a majority of the delegation controlling its action. On the adoption of the platform, a few of the Tennessee delegates, voted in the negative, but the majority favored the adoption, and so controlled the action of the State.

The nomination of Greeley was received with the wildest applause. The indications here to-day are very clear that an overwhelming majority of the people are for Greeley. The greatest confidence in his success prevails. To-day's work has inspired everybody with a firm conviction that Horatio Greeley will be the next President. The devoted brethren who are holding a little conference here—it cannot be dignified as a convention, for it represents no body except those who take part in its proceedings—are so few in number and possess so little influence wherever they are known, that they scarcely excite remark. Their efforts to get up a counter movement to that which culminated in the nomination of Greeley and Brown to-day, will prove an empty failure.

to the Associated Press. Greeley and Brown. NEW YORK, July 10.—A. M. B. Gray Brown had an interview while in the city yesterday with Horatio Greeley. Brown, in his interview, stated that he had attended a class meeting and returns here Thursday. Mr. Greeley was much pleased last evening at the proceedings at Baltimore. He said that he had been told by some of the members of the Cincinnati Platform that the contest for the chairmanship of the Democratic Executive Committee had been decided in favor of Schell of New York, and G. H. McCormick of Chicago. It is generally conceded that the personal of the delegates surpasses that of any previous Democratic Convention.

The South made the best show, having imposed, handsomely looking gentlemen of advanced years. A number of Liberal Republicans, including McClure, Tilton, Goddard, Horan, White, Groves and John Deffenbacher, had seats on the platform. They appeared to be more popular than even the most eminent Democrats. The mention by August Belmont of the name of Greeley in his speech drew forth an outbreak of applause not only from the Liberal Republicans, but from the Democrats also. Doollittle's selection for chairman was the final blow to the straight out Democrats.

THE CONVENTION. BALTIMORE, July 10.—Delegates were generally in their seats by 10 o'clock. A second brass band located in the upper gallery entertained the audience, with various airs in which they were equally proficient. A quarter after ten Chairman Doollittle called the convention to order and Rev. Dr. Leyburn, of Baltimore addressed the throne of the Convention.

The Chairman announced for convenience of the convention and the press that every paper raising to the name of Greeley, should announce his name and State. Mr. Cabell of Arkansas asked a vote for Greeley for five members from Arkansas in excess of their number. Adoption of the Cincinnati Platform. excitement had elapsed, three rousing cries were given for Horatio Greeley. As New York was called, the entire delegation rose, with Gov. Hoffman at their head, and for a moment the convention was transformed into a grand assembly. The convention rose, with three rousing cheers for New York. The Governor attempted to speak, but was interrupted once was renewed in the gallery quarter of the house. Cheers followed, and the galleries rose, the audience waving their hands and handkerchiefs, with enthusiasm became irresistible. After three attempts to be heard, Gov. Hoffman began. He deplored "misson's promise to give Greeley the nomination of any State. He said New York's majority would be larger than Missouri's total vote. Tennessee—Mr. President, in less than a week after the nomination of Horatio Greeley and Grant Brown at Cincinnati, the Democracy of Tennessee are here to support the Democratic platform. There was doubt and hesitation prevailing throughout the Union as to what should be the course of the Democracy of Tennessee. The Democratic platform was the inspiration from the tomb of the Hermitage, (applause) took the responsibility of declaring that it was the high duty of every patriot in this State to support the Cincinnati ticket. (Good, good.) Tennessee was the first to clasp the hand that was extended at Cincinnati, and it now today warmly repeats that support. Tennessee was the first to give three Presidents to the Union, cast her 24 votes for Horatio Greeley, New York, and I desire to say to the gentleman from Missouri, and to the gentleman from New York, that Tennessee was the first to put this ball in motion, and gives to enter the contest with them and give the aid of his own State to a larger majority than either. (Laughter and applause.)

Pennsylvania Goes Solid. After the Chair had announced the result of the ballot, Mr. Wallace, of Pennsylvania, took the platform and was greeted with great cheers. He said: In obedience to the division of political parties in his State, their delegation had cast a part of their vote against the gentleman who, by the usage and customs of the Democratic party, is now its nominee for the Presidency. They would yield to this decision and accept the result which the high and noble majority of the party had decreed. In conclusion, by instruction of his delegation, he moved that the nomination be made unanimous. (Cries of Aye, Aye.)

Upon the announcement of the nomination, the Battle Cry of Freedom, by the band, was followed by Hall to the Chief. When the music ended, a cheer was lowered at the rear of the stage presenting a view of the White House. (Applause.) After being restored, the motion of Mr. Wallace, that the nomination be made unanimous, was put and carried, with one or two dissents only. The roll was called on nomination for Vice President.

Brown was Nominated Vice President by 713 votes to 6 for Stevenson, of Kentucky, and 16 blank.
