

A correspondent of the London Times gives the following description of the city of Jeddah:

"Jeddah without exception, is one of the finest cities in the world; streets broad and good, and the castle, which includes nearly the whole centre of the town built on an eminence. There are three walls or enclosures around this quarter—Within the inner the Tycoon Emperor and his apparent live.

The houses of the princes and nobles are palaces, and you may imagine the size when some contain 10,000 followers. They are built in regular order, forming wide streets some forty yards broad, kept in perfect order, an immense courtyard, with trees and gardens, from the centre of each enclosure, in the midst of which is the house of the owner; the houses containing the followers, servants, stables, &c. form a large enclosure. They are built of one uniform shape. The gateways leading to the courtyard are exceedingly handsome, of massive wood work, ornamented with lacquer and other devices.

From the road that leads by the most to the second wall is one of the finest views I ever recollect of seeing. On one side is the Gulf of Jeddah, with the high hills rising beyond, while on the other is a portion of the great city of Jeddah, with its trees and gardens, picturesque temples and densely crowded streets, extending as far as the eye can reach towards the interior; then there is a view of the trees and green fields in the distance, far away beyond a thickly built suburb; but the most striking view of all is that close by—the well kept green banks of the second defence, rising some seventy feet from the broad moat below, with grand old cedars, over a hundred years of age, growing from its sides. The fine timber, the lay of the ground, the water lilies in the moat, the grandeur, good order and completeness of everything equal, and in some ways surpassing anything I have ever seen in Europe or any part of the world.

We made an expedition into the country. The cottages were surrounded with neatly clipped hedges; the private residences as well walled and kept as any place in England. The same completeness and finish exist in everything. The Botanical Gardens are very good and well cared for; good nurseries of young pines and cedars.

HOUSEKEEPERS BE CAREFUL.—The following caution, from the Albany Evening Journal, will not come amiss at this season of the year, when cold weather is beginning to make itself felt:

"Many of the fires that occur may be traced to a careless disposition of wood and coal ashes in boxes and barrels, especially at this season of the year. Many people are in the habit of placing their ashes in a barrel or other wooden receptacle in immediate proximity to their houses, out of doors. Among these ashes are frequently live coals. The clear, sharp, windy wind displaces the ashes, and the ignited coals set the barrel on fire; and perchance, after the family are asleep, the house takes fire. And these wooden receptacles, placed in an entry or under a staircase, as is too frequently the custom in our cities, are too frequently the cause of many fires, which, for want of reflection, have been attributed to incendiaries."

EFFECT OF TOBACCO ON THE MOUTH.—Both smoking and chewing produce marked alterations in the most expressive features of the face. The lips are closed by a circular muscle, which completely surrounds them and forms their bulky fullness. The eye loses its natural fire, and becomes dull and lurid; it is unresponsive and unappreciative; it answers not before the world; its owner gazes vacantly, and often repels conversation by his stupidity.—J. SHOE BUSINESS.—It is said that one man in every eighty in Massachusetts is a shoemaker. In Lynn, 5,000 men are employed in shoe-making, and the sales in 1858 amounted to \$4,000,000. In Boston there are 218 firms engaged in the trade, doing business to the amount of \$52,000,000. In New York there are only 45 houses.

AN INDIAN BATTLE.—St. Louis, Nov. 25.—The South Pa correspondent of the Republican newspaper says: A battle occurred between the Crow and Snake Indians on the 25th ultimo, in which ten of the former were killed. The fight grew out of the thieving propensities of the Crows.

SHEEP FOR CALIFORNIA.—The Santa Fe Gazette has returns showing that 105,000 sheep are now being forwarded by the citizens of New Mexico to California.—About 10,000 are also on the way to the same destination from Ohio.

PREPARING FOR AN OPEN WINTER.—The Western papers say the migrators have built their winter houses "high up and this," as if contemplating a mild time of it. We hope they have not made a mistake.

It is estimated that about \$1,000,000 per annum has been sent from this country for the last ten years, by the Irish, either for the relief of their brethren in the old world or to provide for their emigration to this country.
