THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS for Van Buren County commenced their January session at the Court House, on Saturday, on Tuesday.

MR. E. O. BRIGGS, Supervisor of this township, having resigned, the Town Board have appointed Mr. G. J. HUDSON, to that office.

CHARLES FOSTER, of Dowagiac, received the recommendation of the Committee appointed for the purpose of making an examination of the competing candidates for the vacant cadetship of this Congressional District.

JACKSON has been decided on as the place for holding the State Convention for the selection of delegates to the Republican National Convention. The Chairman of the State Committee will fix the time for holding such convention as soon as the National Convention is called.

The Convention for nominating candidates for State offices will be held at Lansing.

HON. W. L. BANCROFT, President of the Port Huron & Lake Michigan Railroad, recently presented the Ladies' Library Association of Flint, with a copy of "Audubon's Birds of America," of which there is but one other copy in the State. The gift is probably worth over \$1,000, and was accompanied by a letter from the donor, speaking in terms of praise in relation to the management of the Association, and wishing it "a future as harmonious as the notes of the sweetest songsters in Audubon's list of native melodists."

A SERIOUS CASUALTY.—As Mrs. Jane Manley and her two daughters were driving out in the country on Sunday last, and all three occupying a one seated one horse sleigh; while driving along the road at a moderately rapid gait, they came to a place in the road where the snow had melted away, leaving the earth bare. When the fore part of the sleigh struck the speed was suddenly arrested and the sleigh tipped forward, throwing all three on to the windshield, at which the horse took fright and ran along the road for some distance. One of the daughters was at once precipitated on to the frozen ground with such violence as to bruise and injure her very badly, while the mother and the other daughter became entangled in the rigging in such a manner as to be unable to release themselves, and were drawn by their clothing some distance—the daughter about fifteen rods and the mother about thirty rods—before they became disengaged, and both were mangled in a horrible manner, and received injuries from which it is feared neither can recover. The mother was dreadfully bruised about the back and hips by kicks from the horse, while the daughter was badly injured about the head and had one of her fore-arms broken. The younger daughter who was soonest released is slowly recovering. We learn the above from Mr. C. H. Engle, of Hartford.

A GOOD CROP OF SNAKES.—This month of January has not generally been considered as the best month in the year to gather a good crop of full grown and well matured snakes; but it seems that Tuesday, January 9th, 1872, proved an unusually good day on the Harrington farm, located on the Monroe road, some two miles west of this village. While some men were engaged in covering a coal-pit they unearthed fifteen black snakes and blue racers who had taken possession of a wood-chuck hole, and were snugly domiciled therein for the winter. The united length of this batch of serpents was seventy-seven feet, being an average of over five feet for each individual snake—one, however, measuring six feet from tip of nose to the end of its tail. The mice on this farm will enjoy an immunity from harm from their snakeships next summer which they evidently have not in the past.

Col. F. A. EDWARDS, the founder of Edwardsburg, in Cass county, in 1831, died recently at Yankton, Dakota, in his 65th year. Col. Edwards was well known to the old residents of Niles. He was present at the signing of the treaties with the Indians at the Carey Mission, one mile west of this City, in 1825 and 1827.—Niles Republican.

Oh, mi! Here is a pretty kettle of fish, and not at all flavored to suit our cotemporary.—We have committed some egregious blunder or are exceedingly stupid. We don't borrow his hobby. We have been publishing articles on the gubernatorial and Presidential questions, without approving or disapproving of them.—The articles published by us gave the best thoughts of some of the ablest conducted papers in the State on the Presidency and Governorship. We gave them place in our columns because we wanted our four or five thousand readers to see them. We thought we were doing them a service; we thought that it would be a good thing to let them see, so far as we could, what the press said about questions in which they all felt more or less interest. We gave copious extracts from articles in which the authors viewed the same subjects from different stand-points. We have no recollections, nor does our files reveal the fact, that we ever published the article from the Marshall Statesman, referred to in the Journal, in the above article, but we did publish an article from the Centerville Republican, in which was quoted the Journal's strongest point on the question of Governor, and in which the Republican expressly said that as Allegan County had given St. Joseph County's candidate for Representative (in Congress) in 1870 a hearty support that St. Joseph County would now support Allegan County's candidate for Governor. We did not publish the story about the two men who exchanged work—one helping his neighbor gather a hamper of straw and the neighbor then helping the man gather a basket of chaff. The matter that troubles us most is why the Journal should give us "Hail Columbia," and neglect the Grand Haven Herald who supports that Allegan County would be willing to supply both Governor and Congressman. We apprehend that that arrangement would not exactly suit some other localities—for instance an arrangement entered into by some leading politicians as to this little matter of Governor.—We give it up.

James Fisk, of Erie notoriety, was assassinated in New York on Monday last, by one Stokes, who had heretofore been on the most intimate terms with him. The immediate moving cause of the assassination grew out of some proceedings of the Courts touching the Fisk-Mansfield case, as it is called. The assassination was perpetrated at the Grand Central Hotel in New York. Stokes was at once taken into custody.

The following resolution was offered at the present session of the Board of Supervisors and several amendments were offered proposing Lawrence, Decatur, Bangor, Breedsvele, Grand Junction, &c., as the place to which the county seat should be located on its removal, all of which, having been negatived, the Resolution was tabled.

In our next we will give the proceedings in full, which will show all the propositions and the vote on each.

RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF VAN BUREN COUNTY: That taking into consideration the dilapidation and unsafe condition of the County buildings and the danger that the Records of the County are exposed to from fire, and the unwillingness of the tax-payers of the County to appropriate any more money for the erection of new buildings (or for the repair of the old ones) at the present County Seat, that it is the opinion of the Board that the County Seat should be removed to some more central point in the County. DETROIT MARKET.

DETROIT, JAN. 10, 1872. The attention of traders continues to be taken up with dressed hogs, clover seed and wheat. Hogs have, with the exception of one or two days immediately succeeding the holidays, been in good demand. The shrewdest operators begin to suspect that the crop is nearer in than is generally supposed. The quality of hogs packed in this city or State has been less than was expected, nevertheless including the live hogs slaughtered, the quantity of mess pork made is perhaps larger than last year to the end of the season. Other States have been more than usually active and altogether, the stock of mess pork in the country is much larger than at the same date last year. The live hogs arriving show a steady depreciation, but prices grow firmer. A car of live were sold this morning at 4.30. Dressed are active at 5.10 @ 5.20, both on shipping and packing account. Clover seed is firm at \$5.25 per bu. No. 1 white wheat to-day reached the highest point for a month—\$1.52 1/2. Extra fall off to 1.56 and Treadwell to 1.50, a decline of 1c on each grade since yesterday. Amber is nominal at 1.46 @ 1.47. Flour is slow to participate in the advance on wheat. Dealers continue to offer at old rates, \$7.00 for choice to fancy; the mills ask 7.25 @ 7.50. Corn is tending downward; No. 1, \$1.63 @ 1.64. Oats dull at 41 @ 42c. Barley heavy at 1.60. Rye quiet at 78c. Apples firm at \$2.75 @ 3.00 per bbl. Beans dull and 10 @ 15c lower; prime offered at 2.20. Butter dull as ever, sales of drin at 10 and roll at 18 @ 22c. Eggs wanted at 30c. Dried apples command 8 @ 8 1/2 c; demand not pressing. Onions dull at 50c per bu. Poultry firm at 9 @ 10c for chickens and 12 @ 15c for turkeys, geese 7 @ 9; ducks 10c. Provisions quiet but steady: mess pork 13.50 @ 13.75; lard 8 1/2 @ 9; smoked hams, city 13; country 11 @ 12; shoulders 7 @ 8c. Live cattle firm, prime 4.37; medium 3.50 @ 4.00, thin, 2.75 @ 3.25. Sheep in good demand at 1.50 @ 1.75 for good to prime.
