As we go to press what is selling at a \$1.50; sold at a \$1.60 on Wednesday.

There will be a railroad meeting at the Court House on Tuesday evening. It is particularly desirable that all who feel an interest in railroad matters, should be present and hear the report concerning the progress and prospects of the road, and adopt such measures as shall forward the work. Every citizen is interested in this enterprise, and should turn out and attend this meeting.

At a mass meeting of the colored voters of Vigo County, Ind., held in Terra Haute Thursday night, resolutions were passed condemning Sumner's defection, and reaffirming allegiance to the Republican party.

This Congressional Committee for the ensuing two years for this, the fourth district, consists of the following gentlemen, viz:

James Graham, of Berrien; J. J. Van Ripper, of Cass; E. O. Humphrey, of Kalamazoo; R. E. Case, of St. Joseph; J. J. Woodman, of Van Buren.

Professor Langston of Washington City, addressed an immense outdoor colored Grant and Wilson ratification meeting at Saratoga Springs, Saturday night. The speaker was severe in his criticism of Greeley's course and Sumner's letter. He is himself an eloquent colored Professor in Oberlin University.

Senator Trumbull, in a late speech in Illinois, admitted that he took a Government fee of \$10,000, while he was drawing salary as Senator. His only excuse is, that it was taken in another case, and had nothing to do with the impeachment trial of Johnson. But why did he violate the law?

A colored Grant and Wilson Club was formed at Evansville, Indiana, Wednesday night, 31st, and at the meeting five able speeches were made by colored men. Similar organizations are being formed throughout the several townships of that county.

It will relieve our business men from chasing around town in pursuit of revenue stamps, to know that the use of stamps on almost all kinds of legal, mercantile, and other papers is abolished by a recent act of Congress, which takes effect on the first day of October next. Therefore no stamps will be needed on any business documents, except bank checks, drafts, or orders. One by one, the taxes caused by the rebellion are dropped, under our frugal Republican Administration.

At a meeting of the colored citizens in Titusville, Pa., on Thursday evening, resolutions were adopted to the effect that the recent course of Charles Sumner does not command respect, distrusts any alliance with the Democratic party, and endorsing the course of the Republican party and of General Grant.

Wm. Lloyd Garrison, the father of the Abolition movement, who was mobbed for his sentiments when Sumner was a school-boy, has addressed the latter in a column-and-a-half letter, reviewing the Senator's recent communication to the colored voters, and says:

"I propose to speak with equal plainness, and as earnestly to counsel my colored countrymen not to follow your lead in this matter, but as voters to move unitedly for the election of Grant. This course is demanded by every consideration pertaining to the cause of equal rights, as well as to the furtherance of national peace and unity."

A very large mass meeting of colored people was held in Indianapolis on Friday night to take action in regard to the letter of Senator Sumner. The meeting was addressed by Rev. Mr. Drayles, Major Hawes, J. S. Hinton, colored Elder for the State at large, Rev. R. McCurry, and others. Resolutions were adopted endorsing the Republican party and Gen. Grant, pledging their support to Grant and Wilson.

Post Master General Creswell, in his speech at Lansing stated that Gov. Austin Blair had lodged 79 recommendations for his friends in his (the P. O.) department alone, of which 49 had had commissions issued to them. Yet this did not satisfy his ambition for the control of patronage. We have been informed that his recommendations of friends and partisans lodged in other departments were equally voluminous and treated with the same degree of favor. And yet he was not satisfied. He wanted to be U. S. Senator. He has been constantly in office for the period of sixteen years and four months out of eighteen years ascendancy.—Yet he is not satisfied. What a job Greeley will have on his hands to satisfy this modest chap!

The question certainly settled by the North Carolina election is that the colored men do not fall in their support of the Republican party, in spite of the letters of Sumner, the personal appeals of Schurz, and the begging of Greeley and his organ the New York Tribune. What is true of North Carolina will be true of all the Southern States; and as the colored population of North Carolina is much less than in the other States, the indications of this election promise us at least six Southern States in November.

COMMERCIAL.

NEW YORK MARKET.

New York, Aug. 13, 1872.
Unless in grain, there is not much business stirring. The weather has behaved uncommonly bad the last few days for the commercial interests. Gold keeps up (15 1/2 prem.) and sterling exchange is down (108 1/2) but money is extremely abundant, particularly on call.—Long business paper is not in favor, 7/8 per cent having to be paid for it, while 3 is high on call. Wheat is 3 3/8 and flour 10 1/2 on since a week ago. Red western wheat is quoted at \$1.83 and white Mich. at 1.85@1.89. A great deal of confidence in good prices being obtained for breadstuffs the coming year is felt on account of the advices from Europe and the way in which the market starts. If low prices were going to obtain, it would merely be when an abundant crop of cereals had just been gathered and a fair surplus from the old was still on hand. Corn is steady at 63 1/2 c. Oats are quiet—Mich. 48 1/2 c. Mess pork is 10 1/2 c. better, being firm at \$13.75. Lard is also firmer,—old kettle, 9 1/2 c. But if western butter has got out of the slough, dependent bath not learned it. The quotation is 10 1/2 c. Cheese is in better inquiry; common to prime, 10 1/2 c. Cotton is quiet at 21 1/2 c. for middling uplands. Cotton goods are inactive but firm. Woollens, including flannels, are decidedly more animated. Raw wool shows very little improvement.—There are indications, however, that the worst is over, such for instance, as the resumption of invoices to England. Manufacturers are also getting invoices from the Middle and Western States shipped to them in fictitious names which is a continuation of their policy of keeping out of the market for fear of inflating it. The entire clip of the U. S., it is estimated, will not exceed 110,000,000 lbs., which with 30 or 40 million lbs. of imported, is said to be not sufficient to run our 8,500 sets of woolen machinery for the remaining 19 months. The London sales closed at an advance, and goods, it is predicted by some, will cost more to produce than last year. Be this as it may, goods must improve in value before manufacturers will feel like competing against each other for wool. The grower can well afford to await developments.

DETROIT MARKET.

DETROIT, Aug. 14, 1872.
So far as bulk goods, business is nothing to brag about, yet there is no unreasonable dullness, except in dry goods. Drug jobbers are gradually coming to the new duty of basis.—Turpentine is down 3c.—to 60 by the bbl. Tin has advanced 50c per box, 10x14 L. C. being \$17, and 10x14 L. N. \$20. Cable chain is up 1/2c.—Barn boards and fencing are held at a higher range. Flour is very firm at 10 1/2 c. advance, or \$8.50@8.75 for fancy white. Sellers are in different; indeed, some stock has been withdrawn from sale, and millers are not willing to take orders until flour goes up or wheat comes down. Thus it stood this morning, since when wheat, lower all over, unless a Chicago where a "corner" exists, has tumbled 50c. Prices are now for new wheat, and are as follows:—Extra, \$1.85; No. 1 white, 1.70 (1.81); yesterday No. 2 do, 1.52 (1.62 yesterday); No. 1 amber, 1.49; "Treadwell" is obsolete. The new grades adopted yesterday include, of white wheat extra and No. 1, 2 and 3; of amber, extra and No. 1 and 3 (no No. 2). The No. 1 of each grade is about the same as formerly, except amber, which has a wider range, so that there will be very little difference, so far as Michigan is concerned. It is expected that the decline to-day will scare dealers in the interior, but if this fall passed without a decline on the incoming of the new crop, it would be an exception to the rule, "Stand from under!"—Corn is dull at 53c, and oats quiet at 35 for No. 1, and 40c for white. Apples are in better demand, \$2 1/2 being now paid for State. Butter is dull, unless very choice, which is scarce and commands 17 1/2 c. Cheese is steady at 11 1/2 c. Eggs are dull at 12 1/2 c. Hides are firm at 8 1/2 c. for country. Onions, \$2.50@3.00 per bbl. Potatoes steady at 80 1/2 c. per bu. Talow, 7 1/2 c. A coffee sugar, 12 1/2 c.
