There was a good attendance of children and their parents and friends at the First Baptist church, on Saturday afternoon and evening. An ample supper was spread and music and recitations and intellectual games, enlivened the occasion. The Pastor was surprised by the present of a silk handkerchief from his class, "Band of Workers."

The Board of Supervisors have been in session this week. Their settlement with the County Treasurer shows the receipts of his office for the year, to be \$57,187.20, his disbursements \$52,528.76, leaving a balance on hand of \$4,658.44. W. W. Bass, of Lawrence, was elected Supt. of Poor, to fill vacancy. Judge Mills and the clerk were authorized to employ a stenographer for this county, at a salary not to exceed \$600 per annum.

Quite a large number of the friends of C. C. Engle, gave him a call on Friday evening last, for the purpose of "warming up" his new house, and they did it effectually. The members of the Allegan county bar and some of his friends, on Friday last, the close of Judge Arnold's first full term as Circuit Judge, presented him with a beautiful gold watch, valued at \$150. The presentation took place at the Court House. In the evening a reception was given him at the house of Hon. W. B. Williams, where a presentation was made to him by the Allegan county bar, of a silver tea service, embracing six pieces, richly chased and ornamented. Judge Arnold has the reputation of being an upright and honorable Judge, and worthy of such gifts.

The announcement of the arrest and escape of O. S. Beck, formerly of Marcellus, at Decatur, Ill., the other day, as was then stated by the papers that he was wanted for killing a man at Marcellus a few years ago, caused considerable excitement and was generally disbelieved, as but few knew that he was wanted for any such purpose. It turns out, however, that he is charged with being the cause of the explosion of the boiler in Taylor's mill about four years ago at that place. After his arrest two of his pals attacked the officer, overpowered him and released Beck. It is hoped he will be re-arrested.

Miss Emma J. Stover, of Lawton, who has recently been working in the family of Doctor(?) W. H. Nelson, says under oath that he is a very bad man. He is now under arrest awaiting examination before Esq. Mason, on a charge of bastardy. This is not the first time similar acts have been laid to his charge since he has lived in this town. We are told he pretends to practice the art of healing, in a clairvoyant state, or under the influence of departed spirits, especially of one Indian Jim. If the sworn statement of the girl is true, he is an old scoundrel, unfit to be tolerated in a civilized community.

The annual meeting of the Van Buren County Agricultural Society, was held at the Town Hall on Tuesday. The following officers were elected for the ensuing year: G. D. Boyce, President; C. W. Young, Vice Pres.; C. A. Harrison, Sec.; J. W. Free, Treas.; O. P. Morton, E. P. Mills, J. T. Bangs, A. Van Anken, J. Q. Adams and E. W. Herron, Directors for two years. A committee of five, consisting of the following gentlemen, were appointed to raise by subscription, \$2,500, to pay off the Society's indebtedness: Asa Crofoot, C. A. Harrison, J. W. Free, Geo. W. Bash and G. W. Koons. No one will be called upon to pay, unless the whole amount is raised. Asa Crofoot headed the list with \$100.

Bruce Wilcox, of whose injury we made a brief mention last week, died at his home in Chicago, on Monday afternoon, and his funeral took place on Wednesday. C. P. Rawson and Columbus Engle attended. Mr. Wilcox was born at Lockport, N. Y., and removed to this village with his parents when a mere lad. He had been a railroad man for 32 years, a large portion of the time as conductor. The accident which caused his death, was the only one he had ever sustained. He saw the bridge was open in time to have jumped from his engine, but thinking he could save the whole train, with true heroism, stood at his post until it was too late. He leaves a wife and three children to mourn his loss.

Elder Ebert preached two exceedingly interesting discourses at the Christian church, on Sunday last. In the morning he advised his parishioners to "invoice" their stock. Among many other sensible things, he said every family should be provided with a copy of some of their local papers and in addition thereto with a State paper, some broad liberal magazine like Scribner or Harper, and a good religious paper, and that no man could keep abreast of the times without these, and it was a christian duty to provide the family with them. His subject in the evening was "Mis-spent Time," and his remarks were sensible and sound. The Elder seems to realize that short and vigorous discourses, applicable to every day life, are far preferable to long winded, prosy, doctrinal sermons. What surprises us is that his church fooled around so long in search of a pastor, with such good material right at home.
