### How to Eat Cucumbers.

As the season for this elegant and toothsome fruit is upon us, we give the following directions how to prepare it so as to avoid b-y ache and doctor's bills. First catch your cucumber, then remove its jacket carefully so as not to mar the fruit, see that you have a thin bladed, sharp knife with which you slice the fruit into very thin slices, then pour cold water over them and let them stand for twelve hours, occasionally changing the water, then drain off the water and put on salt, pepper and vinegar to taste, place carefully upon a platter and then—feed them to the pigs.
