The Michigan Military Academy has recently closed the most successful year of its life, although it has been a success from its foundation. The new requirements for admission require applicants to be at least fourteen years old, and not less than four and one-half feet in height and of good moral character. The object of the institution is to secure the best culture to trustworthy students.

A meeting was held at the court house last Monday evening to discuss the matter of continuing Oak Park Seminary in this village.
