houses can be assured of good accommodations  
for both man and beast, and travelers

moil and all the unpleasant incidents and  
surroundings that necessarily and unavoid-  
ably accompany the keeping of saloons in  
connection with public houses. Certainly  
our people ought to rejoice that our land-  
lords have adopted this course, voluntarily  
and without compulsion, and do not follow  
the example of some hotel keepers who, dog-  
in-the-manger-like, close their houses be-  
cause they are not allowed to sell whiskey.
